trict towards the relief of the distress now existing in
the cotton manufacturing districts, "from which so
many thousands are now suffering with such exam-
plary patience and fortitude." The order announces
that the subscription lists will remain open during the
current month, the subscriptions of the officers and
troops being entirely voluntary, and under no circum-
stances is an individual to be asked to contribute.
The contributions of the private soldiers are not to
exceed 3d. per day, those of corporals 6d., and ser-
geants, 9d., which amounts might be paid out of the
"clearance" money at the end of the month. The
subscription of officers are not to exceed half a day's
pay. The officers commanding the various corps,
together with the heads of departments are invited to
form themselves into a general working committee for
the purpose of carrying out the necessary arrange-
ments.

The numerous important additions which have
recently been made to the Royal Regiment of Artillery
by the amalgamation of the Indian Army, together
with the several improvements effected by the
Duke of Cambridge since his appointment to the
colonely of the regiment, have had the effect of
rendering this branch of the service superior in num-
erical force and efficiency to any in the world. The
combined force of Royal Artillery now consists of 62
generals, 60 colonels, 143 lieutenant-colonels, 586
captains, 761 lieutenants, 28 officers of the Coast
Brigade, 10 riding-masters, 16 paymasters, 28 quarter-
masters, 92 medical officers, and 27 veterinary sur-
geons, the whole of whom are distributed over 30
brigades, consisting of 5 horse brigades, 12 garrison,
9 field, and 4 field and garrison brigades. The
brigades consist of an aggregate of 241 batteries, the
strength of each battery numbering on an average
150 non-commissioned officers and men. Exclusive
of officers, the Royal Artillery now numbers 36,000
men of all ranks, in addition to which there is also
the Depot Brigade, consisting four divisions, two of
which are stationed at Woolwich, one at Warley, and
one at Sheerness. The four divisions comprises
20 batteries, the establishment of each battery being
200 men, giving an additional of 4,000 men, thus
swelling the total strength of the Royal Artillery to
40,000 men of all grades.
