

...and suspicion fell on the prisoner, who was in custody. Mr. Quin having had these suspected some money to be marked, and he (Mr. Quin) described to their worships how it was. Among the marked coins was a half-crown which would be satisfied that the coin was into the till with some other marked about one o'clock on the day of the detection, and after it was missed out of the till. Hav- ing suspicion fastened on the prisoner, Mr. Quin searched, and the marked money was found in session. Under those circumstances, and as to others in similar positions, he thought it would be prudent to ask for informations. John Quin sworn—The prisoner, Michael Quin, over twenty years in my employment; my name was first drawn about two years ago to the name of the company he kept, and from his mode of living at the time in question; I found some coins and placed them in the till in my hands they were half crowns and florins, four of the one and four of the latter; I had on a previous day marked some coins which were also taken; one (the one produced); of the four I marked; as I missed it I sent for the sergeant of who searched the prisoner in my presence; I find the coin on the prisoner's person. Mr. O'Donnell (who defended the prisoner)—I do not doubt that this is one of the half crowns; I marked it with a punch; there were two other punch marks; I am not sure whether it was in the till after marking or whether I gave it to the young man to put in; it was put into the till one o'clock and taken at three; the prisoner never authorised to take money, but I often saw him take money from parties, but he used to hand the money to the young man; sometimes when the young man would be in a hurry the prisoner would help him; I think that this was taken out of the till and taken to me in change. The Bench—On account of his unfortunate confession, if he only made an open confession of it and named who his associates were I would have nothing to do with him, and let him off out of the country; even if he sent to me this morning I would have let him off altogether. Mr. O'Donnell—Would you Mr. Quin have any objection to his giving bail? The Bench—Certainly not. The Bailman—What bail would you give? Mr. O'Donnell—I dare say £20 and two of £10. Mr. M'Mahon said, being in trade himself, and regarding the consequence of such frauds he would be disposed to question whether they would accept of some discussion on the part of the magistrates as to whether he should find bail, himself in £40 and two sureties of £20 each. Mr. T. O'Brien, of Lock-quav, summoned Mr. Richard Heffernan, for an assault and abusive language. Mr. O'Brien stated that the defendant's yard being joined to his, pigs sometimes go into Mr. Heffernan's; on last week Mr. O'Brien was looking at his pigs feeding when the defendant came out, some conversation having taken place, he struck Mr. O'Brien on the head with a stick, and used abusive language towards him. Mr. Heffernan said he did not strike with a stick at Mr. Heffernan was bound to the peace—himself in £5 and two sureties of £10 each. After disposing of a few uninteresting cases, the court adjourned. There were several parties summoned for the non-payment of rates due to the Corporation and decess, with various stays of execution, granted in all.

An Act of Parliament has just been printed to provide better means for the safe removal of poor persons under the laws now in force on the subject. In pursuance of a warrant of removal signed by a magistrate is to contain the name and address of the persons to be removed, and a statement is to be made as to their health. A copy of the warrant is to be sent to parochial officers of the place whither the persons are to be removed before such removal take place, and they are to be properly received, under a penalty of £10 if women and children are to be removed from England to England from Scotland or Ireland during the winter months.
