It was the intention of his friends and admirers to have invited him to a farewell entertainment; but his departure has been so sudden that it was impossible, on such short notice, to get it up in a style which Mr. Shinkwin's merits deserved. We hear that the soldiers involved in the alleged robberies at the Sanitarium also proceed in the *Undine*, the Attorney-General having abandoned the prosecution.—*South African Advertiser.*
