LIMERICK PROTESTANT YOUNG MEN'S ASSOCIATION.
The fourteenth of the Winter Course of Lectures in connection with this society was delivered on Tuesday evening last in the Protestant Orphan Hall to a highly respectable and intelligent assemblage, by the Rev. A. Averell Ramsey, of Dublin, who chose for his theme "The World we live in—its Structure—its inhabitants, and its Destiny." The chair was taken, in the absence of the esteemed president, the Rev. Benjamin Jacob, by Dr. D'Esterre, and on the platform we noticed the Rev. Richard Moore, rector of Clonsilla; the Rev. Raywood Orpen, Rev. Pitt Johnson, Rev. Robert Kerr, James Alexander, Esq., vice-president; Dr. Parker, Dr. Lyons, W. G. Sibrop, Esq.; Henry Voecker, Esq.; F. W. Kennedy, Esq., &c. The meeting was opened with prayer by the Rev. Mr. Orpen. The chairman in a few suitable remarks introduced the reverend lecturer, who, on coming forward, was greeted with much applause. He dwelt some length on the formation of our globe and the future destiny of its inhabitants and passed on in a strain of beautiful language to the third part of his subject—the destiny of the world—and wound up one of the most able and instructive lectures it has ever given on our privilege to hear. A cordial vote of thanks was proposed by the Rev. Pitt Johnson, seconded by James Alexander, Esq., and carried with acclamation. The reverend gentleman, on rising to return thanks, said it was with feelings of sincere pleasure that he came down once more to visit his many friends in this city, and he rejoiced to hear that this society (of which he was a member for many years) was flourishing notwithstanding the many difficulties it had to contend with. The meeting closed with the exhortation.

Mr. Richard Weaver, the converted collier, gave his first lecture this year, on yesterday evening, in the Theatre Royal, which was filled to overflowing by persons belonging to all classes of our fellow citizens. The services of the evening commenced with the singing of a hymn, after which Mr. Weaver read the 3rd chapter of the acts of the apostles, and then having sang another hymn, he selected for his text that saying of our Redeemer—"There is no joy in heaven over one sinner that is converted than over 99 just persons, who need no repentance." He preached on the absolute necessity of repentance, and was listened to throughout with the utmost attention by the vast congregation, composed of persons holding various religious opinions. Edmond Hally v. the Waterford and Limerick Railway Company.

The Waterford and Limerick Railway Company were decreed in the sum of £8, being compensation for the loss of two pigs belonging to plaintiff, a farmer, residing at Lisnamuck, near Cahir, which were killed, one on each of two different occasions, by trains, on the 16th of January. It was alleged that the fences were bad.

THE NEW CIVIL BILL REGULATIONS.

In the case of John Holway, Cappanack v. John Donovan, for overholding possession, the civil bill was dismissed, because the service was not made fifteen clear days before the first day of the sessions.

TUESDAY.

INSOLVENT CASE.

re JONATHAN PIM.

Mr. Ryan, solicitor, Limerick, opposed the discharge of this gentleman, on behalf of the three detaining creditors from Limerick—namely, Mr. John Bernal, Auctioneer, who lent £94 to the Insolvent, who, in return, passed him a bill for £100, which was unpaid. Mr. D. Hennessey, victualler, to whom £28 16s. was due, and Mr. Coleman O'Connell, Tavern keeper, to whom Mr. Pim was indebted in the sum of £54, for billiards, cigars, &c. The debts on the schedule amounted to £784, but all the other creditors were satisfied with the offer of 5s. in the £, which was ready to be paid should there be a unanimous consent entered into. The grounds of opposition were *Firstly*:—a false statement on the face of the schedule, as to the payment for lodging during a portion of the time, when he had a house rent free from the Waterford and Limerick Railway Company. *Secondly*—Having recklessly contracted debts without any reasonable expectation of payment. On this point there was a very lengthened examination of the petitioner himself.

Mr. Ryan said that on reference to the schedule it would be seen that when these debts were contracted, during five years he was living at the rate of £435, while his salary was only £300.

Mr. Vowell showed through his client, the petitioner, that he had been paying rent for the house he had from the company. Also, that he entered upon his situation as locomotive engineer to the Waterford and Limerick Railway Company, in debt to his Dublin creditors to the amount of £300, of which sum he had since paid £83, and was determined to pay off all he owed both in Dublin and Limerick, if time were given him. Everything had been done to meet the pressing demands of the creditors; and Mr. Ellard, solicitor, and town clerk of Limerick, a most respectable gentleman, was there to prove that the insolvent petitioner had offered to allow *two thirds* of his salary to be received by him for the satisfaction of his debts, but some would not be satisfied. His client might well say, save me from my friends.

Mr. Ellard was subsequently sworn, and corroborated the observations of Mr. Vowell, so far as that Mr. Pim had volunteered to allow £150 to be received by him, and appropriated in liquidation of his debts. Mr. Bernal, he should say (in reply to Mr. Ryan) had acted towards Mr. Pim in a kindly and forbearing spirit. Owing to the pressing effects of his debts, Mr. Pim was not able to apply himself properly to his business, and it was therefore he was suspended, but he had reason to believe the notice he received was merely cautionary. The company were perhaps annoyed at having an execution at Mr. Pim's house, on the railway premises.

Mr. Vowell showed that only the brass work of a railway engine, given to the petitioner by Mr. Dargan, had to be sold to meet one execution, at the suit of Mr. Ryan. Mr. Pim and the rest of the creditors of this respectable family had entered into a mutual arrangement in favour of their mother, so as to secure to her the family property, of a share of which he had expectations.

This case having terminated, the court setting aside the first ground of opposition, said that the second was proved, namely, contracting of debts without
