CANTERBURY ELECTION.—CANTERBURY, THURSDAY. After a hard-fought contest the election has been won by the Conservative candidate, Mr. Henry Alexander Tyler Johnston, the son of the late member. At 5 past 5 the Sheriff, as the returning officer of the borough, made the declaration from the hustings in the market, the following being the numbers polled each candidate:—Mr. Henry Alexander Butler Weston Conservative, 694; Major William Lyon, 691; Majority 3. Mr. Johnston and Major Weston both addressed the electors, the latter gentleman expressing his mortification at the result of the test, but intimating the probability of a general election not being far distant, when he should be happy to place his services again at the disposal of the electors.

On Monday a public meeting was held in Freestone-hall, Edinburgh, for the purpose of petitioning Parliament against the marriages of Affinity Bill, which, for the first time for several years, it is proposed to extend to Scotland.

A general movement against the Bill is being made among the local presbyteries in Scotland, Established, Dissenting, and already numerous petitions have been sent up.

THE TRACY PEERAGE.—It is stated that this long-extended case is likely to be early brought before the committee of Privileges, in the House of Lords, for her hearing and final adjudication. The present plaintiff is Matthew Tracy, Esq., who traces his descent from the second marriage of Robert, second son and Baron Tracy—John, the third Viscount of Tracy having died without male issue. He is the eldest surviving son of Martin Tracy, Esq., of City Mayo, Ireland, and seeks to recover possession of the titles.

On Wednesday afternoon, a large and influential delegation from the hop growers had an interview with the Chancellor of the Exchequer, in Downing-street.

The Inman steamship Glasgow sailed on Wednesday for Liverpool for New York. Besides a ship she took out about 20 cabin passengers and a large amount of cargo, consisting of manufactured goods.

A proposition by certain members of the Corporation of Manchester, to reduce the Town Clerk's (Heron) salary from £2,000 per annum, voted some time ago to £1,500 per annum, was negatived by 39 votes against 19.

The Marquis of Donegall has taken Hampstead hall, Berks, late the residence of the Countess of Craven, for a term of years.

The Marquis and Marchioness of Downshire, and Alice Hill and the Earl of Hillsborough, have departed for Southsea, and are staying at Clarendon House.

Two of Napoleon's two speeches are going to be translated into Italian, under the inspection of the Emperor himself, and 100,000 copies of this translation are struck off and sent to Turin. His Imperial Majesty dined on Sunday at the Tuileries, and had a conversation with his imperial cousin.

It is said that the 18th Regiment of the French has received orders to hold itself in readiness to go for Mexico, and that it is to repair to Cherbourg for embarkation.

The Queen of Nations has arrived from Melbourne, £133,000 in gold. There are still nine Australasian ships at sea, with an aggregate £750,000 worth of cargo to hand.

The steamer on the City of Baltimore, which left New York on the 15th ult., and is now overdue, have been valued at £8 8s.

The death of Mrs. Stanley, widow of the late Bishop of Exeter, is announced.

Warrior has been assisted into Hamoaze, where she will repair defects.

Publicists of Berlin speak of extraordinary preparations which have been in progress at that city for some time.

The new found City, six miles up the Ohio river from Cincinnati, is the largest military hospital in the United States. Its capacity is 1,000 patients. The hospital is a model. The Sisters of Charity are in charge of the Dietetic and Linen departments, and are appointed to the care of each ward.

A man, who was found guilty of manslaughter at the Criminal Court, London, has been sentenced to three months' penal servitude, and his three companions to three months' imprisonment each.

Times says there is nothing in the speech of the Emperor on the Roman question which should prevent a French Emperor from acting some months hence in the very track of the policy designed by his late cousin.

The failure of the firm of Sir Henry and Edward Baring, old-established corn factors, of London, is announced. The liabilities are estimated at £150,000, which about £30,000 was said to be unsecured. The firm are holders of a large quantity of securities.

SUDEN DEATH.—On Thursday about one o'clock, an aged respectable farmer named Nicholas Ryan, who resided at Knockroe, Caherconlish, in this county, died suddenly while sitting in a chair at his own fire-side. He was at the time making some jocular remarks to his wife, when he fell back and expired in less than a minute in the arms of those who went to his assistance.

Walter Nugent, Esq., High Sheriff of Longford, has written to the Freeman's Journal, contradicting the assertion in the Daily Express that the conduct of the mob in the town of Longford during the recent election had rendered the intervention of the military necessary. Mr. Nugent had first written to the Daily Express to the same effect, but his letter not appearing, he applied to the Freeman's Journal.

The Guardians of the Ennis Union having discovered that several persons with money in their possession enter the workhouse, as paupers, the subject was brought before the board at its last meeting. The master, in reply, said that the moment he received an admission ticket from parties he was bound to admit them; and if he found money on them all he could do was to take it from them for the night and hand it over to them in the morning. He had no power to keep their money, or to refuse them admission. Mr. Cullinan thought that the law never contemplated that they were to admit people into the house who had plenty of money to pay for their support, and it was resolved that the Commissioners should be requested to deliver their opinion upon the point.

John Thomas MacSheehy, Esq., presided in the police court this morning, and directed informations to be taken against Michael Ryan the farmer's boy, on a charge of sheep stealing. The prisoner will be tried at Killaloe quarter sessions.

Constable Nash, formerly of City Limerick Constabulary, and now stationed at Macroom, County Cork, has arrested there a female named Ellen Pordell for the brutal murder, on Sunday last, of her illegitimate child, whose head she nearly severed from its body.

In the libel case of Armstrong v. the Rev. John Quinn, tried at Armagh Assizes, and noticed in our last, the jury were locked up all night on Thursday, and discharged yesterday morning without finding a verdict.

OUTRAGE NEAR CARRICK-ON-SUIR.—On the morning of the 3rd inst. two iron safes, the property of Michael McGuire, a respectable farmer, were taken on his farm at Rathcoy, and portions of them carried away. His having come into possession of a farm last month from which another tenant was evicted by the sheriff for non-payment of rent is the assigned cause of this outrage.

As a goods train from Waterford, on Sunday evening, after leaving Kilsheelan station, was proceeding towards Clonmel, some ruffians hurled a large stone which struck the van in which the guard was seated and smashed a panel therein. Fortunately no further injury was done.

A TOWN COUNCILLOR IN TROUBLE AT THE CORK ASSIZES.—Mr. Barney Sheehan, an eccentric member of the Cork Town Council, got into trouble on Monday. His oddities had been tolerated to an extraordinary extent by his fellow-citizens, but Baron Hughes did not understand that sort of indulgence. In reference to a remark of counsel about frivolous actions, Mr. Sheehan, in a loud voice, said, "It's all the fault of them humbug pious attorneys, my Lord." The judge inquired who the man was, and at once ordered him to be placed in the dock. "Oh, my Lord," said Barney, "but I beg your pardon, Sir, for a minute, I didn't mean anything at all, indeed Sir." He was kept in the dock till the Court rose at 6 o'clock, when Professor Barry pleaded for him, and obtained his release on condition that he should not enter either of the courts during the rest of the sittings, Baron Hughes explained that he had been aware that the same person interrupted the Court on former occasions.

The news of the pacific termination of the American difficulty had given great satisfaction in India. There was great excitement in the Cotton Market on 9th February. The Bombay merchants had telegraphic news from London, via Alexandria, to January 25th.

The commercial circulars of the 12th say piece goods of all sorts still continued depressed, and prices showed no symptoms of rising.

Other commercial news anticipated. Major-General Townsend is about to obtain the colonelcy of the 5th Foot.

On account of the proficiency attained by the volunteer artillery corps generally in the practice of gunpowder, the Secretary of War has decided that from the 1st of April next an increase shall be made in the annual allowance of ammunition.

The liabilities of Messrs. Quinn and Dennison, cloth merchants, Leeds, are reported at £20,000. They were chiefly engaged in the Irish trade.

A Post Office order announces that on and after the 5th April letters for passengers on board the Cunard mail steamers, calling at Queenstown, provided they be addressed to the care of the officer in charge of the mails and registered, may be posted in any part of the United Kingdom, and they will be delivered on board the packets at Queenstown. Letters for passengers on board the Mediterranean packets, about to sail from Southampton with mails for India, may be posted on similar conditions.

Accounts from Newfoundland state that the steam transport Calcutta was frozen in about five miles off St. John's, with 700 soldiers on board. The Hydra was expected from Halifax to help them. The Calcutta had been 23 days crossing, and consumed all her coal and was burning the spare wood from the ship. She had been greatly damaged by storms and ice, and lost all her boats. None of the horses had been lost.

The strength of the Channel squadron at present is represented in ships of 317 guns and 4,500 men.

The Herald complains of the fate of Mr. Gregory's motion last night, which shows that we have no rule of conduct, no principles of policy beyond the dictates of self interest. The Daily News regards Mr. Foster's speech as a masterly reply to Mr. Gregory's motion on the whole question.

PARLIAMENTARY SUMMARY.

HOUSE OF LORDS.

The Earl of Derby complained of the articles of the revised code affecting pupil teachers who had nearly served their apprenticeship, and also of penalties for not having pupil teachers when the managers have to be responsible for their payment.

Earl GRANVILLE did not apprehend that there would practically be any injustice with respect to pupil teachers, as already indentured provision was made that they should be paid by the managers, and in their default by the Government.

The house then adjourned at 7:25.

Mr. LEFROY asked the Chief Secretary for Ireland if the Government had received full information as to the riots which were alleged to have taken place at the late election for Longford, and if Government intended taking measures to prevent a repetition of such proceedings on any future occasion.

SIR R. PEEL said the subject was one which had given rise to very strong feelings in the minds of hon. members of both sides of the house. There was no doubt that many of the electors had been ill treated, and had suffered by a lawless mob. He stated that the scenes of violence and outrage which had taken place had not been witnessed in Ireland for many years.

Mr. GREGORY called attention to the blockade of the ports of the Confederate States of America, and moved an address for a copy of any correspondence on the subject subsequent to the papers already presented to the house. After a very long argument, in which the hon. member expressed his strong sympathy for the Confederate States, and urged on government the illegality and inefficiency of the blockade, and after considerable argument by Mr. Bentinck, Mr. W. Forster, Sir James Ferguson, and Mr. Lindsay, the house adjourned at 11:15 p.m.
