INQUEST.—An inquest was opened to-day by John Gleeson, Esq., Coroner for the city, and before a respectable jury, on view of the body of Frances Sheahan, an unfortunate girl of the town, who, it is alleged, was thrown into the river on last night, at Howley's-quay, by (as it is also alleged) Michael Keating, a sailor from Kilrush, who was seen last in her company previous to the fatal and most miserable termination of her existence in this world. The body of the deceased lay exposed on the quay, with its head leaning against an anchor, and blood exuding from the nose, and gazed upon by a large and pitying crowd. The accused, who is in custody, is a powerful and handsome young man. The coroner and jurors having viewed the body, and having returned to the house where the inquiry was commenced, it was announced that the inquest would be adjourned until 12 o'clock on Monday, at the Town Hall, in order to give the officers of justice an opportunity of collecting more evidence than they already have. Two witnesses were then sworn and bound in re-

cognizances of £50 each to appear on Monday.

The prisoner who declared his innocence, was then

handcuffed and committed under the Coroner's detain ing warrant until Monday.

DESPERATE ASSAULT .- On Thursday night a murderous and wanton assault was made, by his domestic servants, upon Sir Richard De Burgho, Bart., at his residence, the Island, Castleconnell. It appears that Sir Richard and Lady De Burgho, with Sir Thomas and Lady Fitzgerald, and others, came into Limerick to attend the performance of the Garrison Theatricals. Sir Richard rode, in order to afford room in the carriage, to his party. On return home Sir Richard arrived first at the house, and was for some time knocking at the door before he could get admittance. At length the butler, (Brosnahan) opened the hall door, when Sir Richard, noticing that he was in a druken state, desired him to retire, and that he would himself perform the duty of opening the carriage door. This the butler would not assent to, and proceeded to open the door of the carriage, when Sir Richard endeavoured to prevent him, but the man forcibly persisted, giving his master a shove. Sir Richard passed the matter over awaiting the retirement of his lady, and Sir Thomas Fitzgerald to their apartments, when he heard loud talking in the kitchen, which induced him to go down stairs, and upon entering a violent attack was made upon him by Brosnahan, who struck him severely over the forchead, laying bare the scalp, which fell depressed in the held seafacts. STATE OF THE COTTON MARKET ABROAD.

The Times' city article says accounts from all the principal parts of the world continue to confirm the impression that even up to the present moment the manufacturers and merchants of Lancashire are de riving a balance of profit from the war in the United States and the check to the importance of the raw material. At no single point has any scarcity of stocks vet been shown, the total on hands at most marts being still such as to check a full respone to the upward movement of price here. The amount of over-trading carried on during the years immediately preceding 1861 must therefore have been beyond all ormer experience. It is probable that the events which are now causing distress among Lancashire operatives have converted
