SEA-WEED AS MANURE.—Great Britain alone, ex-
 ce of Ireland and the Scottish Isles, possesses a
 line of seven thousand miles, and it is assumed
 ne that sea-weed might be collected to an ave-
 of 3,000 tons per mile per annum. And yet out
 s large natural supply but a very small propor-
 s collected and utilized. In its most prosperous
 elp was never manufactured to a greater extent
 United Kingdom than 28,000 tons per annum
 amount which would require about 560,000 tons
 -weed. But the quality now used in kelp-
 g in Great Britain is scarcely more than a third
