FATAL OCCURRENCE—CORONER'S IN-
 QUEST.

A most melancholy catastrophe, which has plunged
 two respectable families in humble life into grief,
 occurred on Thursday evening last by the accidental
 drowning, in a quarry hole, of three fine young boys,
 who, full of health, strength, and the exuberant spirits
 of boyhood, went to amuse themselves by sailing on a
 raft, from which they were suddenly precipitated into
 eternity. The following are the details of this truly
 heartrending occurrence:—The bodies of the poor
 youths were this day consigned to their final resting
 place attended by large corteges of their friends who
 came into the city from all parts of the County.

An inquest was held on yesterday by John Gleeson,
 Esq., City Coroner, at the house of Mr. Anthony
 M'Donough, Wickham-street, on the bodies of Cor-
 nelius Tracey and Stephen Tracey, the son and ne-
 phew of Mr. Michael Tracey, butcher, Catherine-
 street, the former aged 12 and the latter aged 14
 years; and on the body of Peter Dundon, son of
 Patrick Dundon, corn-broker, of Wickham-street.

Thomas M'Donough, aged about 13 years, on being
 sworn, said—"I knew Cornelius Tracey, Stephen
 Tracey, and Patrick Dundon, who are now dead;
 the three deceased and four other boys (seven in all),
 were on a plank in the County Gaol quarry, on yester-
 day evening, about the hour of 7 o'clock; Johnny
 Grady, Ned Brown, Tom Boyle and myself, were on
 the plank; Patrick Dundon, one of the deceased,
 told me to shove out on the plank, and I told him to
 do so, and I gave him a paddle, which he took, and
 shoved out; all the rest of us went on the other side
 of the plank and overbalanced it, and we all fell off it
 into the water; Patrick Dundon and Steve Tracey
 fell off together; the others fell after; but I made a
 jump and reached the land, and Ned Brown paddled
 with his arms and reached the land; John Grady was
 struggling, and Brown and I brought him in; Boyle
 struggled and paddled until he reached some weeds,
 of which he laid hold, and thereby got to land;
 Dundon sank once, and then rose and sank again, and
 disappeared; Stephen Tracey made an effort to reach
 land also, but was caught by the weeds and sank;
 Cornelius Tracey rose three times and sank three
 times; the plank was about twelve feet long and two
 deals broad.

In answer to a juror, the constable said that the
 plank was in that quarry-hole since a "diver" used
 to be there, and it had been allowed to remain there
 ever since, and all the children of the neighbourhood
 visited it for the purpose of sailing on it.

The witness said it was his opinion that Cornelius
 Tracey rose under the plank, and not being able to
 get out, he was drowned.

Edward Brown, a boy of 13 years, and residing in
 Cornwallis-street, said that he was with the party on
 yesterday evening, and was on the plank off which he
 fell, and assisted in bringing Ned Boyle on land;
 he had heard M'Donough's evidence, and it was quite
 correct; there is a notice up stating that "any one
 trespassing on the land will be prosecuted;" this
 notice is posted in a field belonging to Mr. Shaw, and
 which adjoins the quarry; there is a wall surrounding
 the field, but a part of it is broken down; we got
 over the wall at the jail side.

Thomas Boyle, another boy who fell off the plank,
 was rescued by laying hold of the weeds, in which he
 struggled for more than a quarter of an hour. He then
 stripped himself and got on the plank, and steered it
 to where Cornelius Tracey was sinking; Tracey held
 out his arm, and witness reached the paddle under his
 arm, but he was not able to hold it, and he then sank
 and rose no more.—None of the party could swim.

James O'Donnell, from the Irishtown, deposed that
 he found the body of Cornelius Tracey in the quarry-
 hole, at about 3 or 9 feet from the land; the body of
 Stephen Tracey was found previously, in about 16 feet
 of water—that of Cornelius, was found in about 6 feet
 of water; the quarry varies in depth—some parts of it
 are very deep.

The jurors recommended the removal of the plank,
 as it was only an inducement to boys to go into dan-
 ger. They also requested that the police should be on
 the alert to detect and punish those who made the
 field a rendezvous for gambling on the Sabbath.

The Jury found that the three deceased boys came
 by their death by accidental drowning, caused by the
 upsetting of the raft on which they were amusing
 themselves; and the Jury earnestly recommended the
 removal of the plank, or raft, by the person whose prop-
 erty it is.
