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continued—It is our duty to warn the Government, and if we think the war unjust we should say so, and refuse our concurrence in French blood and treasure being poured out with our responsibility. It was said last year that a foreign prince should be placed on the throne of Mexico.

M. Billault declared, however, that the object of the expedition was to obtain redress.

M. Favre accused the government of concealing the truth in the account read to the Chamber of the conversation between M. Thouvenal and Lord Cowley. He then reviewed the Mexican affairs, and asked, in speaking of the Jecker affair, if it were permitted to engage countries for uncertain causes. He afterwards gave an account of the Jecker affair, which the English minister had stigmatised as robbery and continued—that is the honest commerce for which we make war. M. Favre mentioned the correspondence seized by Juarez, whence it resulted that Jecker flattered himself that he would receive from the high functionaries of the Empire a support he certainly had not met with. The *Monteur* has not however any denial. M. Favre also mentioned that in the course of '62, and after his dynasty had become known, he was naturalised as a French citizen, under these circumstances, M. Favre did not think any astonishment should be felt at the French ultimatum having caused the withdrawal of England and Spain. He said on the main principle of international law I disavow the war against Mexico. The war will always be unfortunate, even after the taking of the City of Mexico, for Juarez will continue the war in the free provinces. To get to Orizaba it cost 104 million francs; to go further than the city of Mexico the treasures of France will not suffice. The war in Mexico is a great mistake, it is a second occupation of Rome, minus the glory of having defeated a great principle. I cannot associate myself with a war undertaken on mendacious information.

M. Billault will reply to-morrow. He undertook, moreover, to fully reply to all the accusations brought against the policy of France.

GENERAL NEWS.

The Archbishop of Canterbury in a letter condemns Bishop Colenso's book, and declares he will vindicate the faith of the church as far as he can. There is an immense demand for Colenso's second volume, published on Tuesday.

The holder having the option, after a certain period, of exchanging his cotton for Confederate state bonds, bearing 8 per cent interest at 70, has been partially accepted.

LAUNCH OF THE SPIRIT OF THE SEA.—Belfast, Saturday morning.—Yesterday, at high water, the beautiful modern ship, above named, was successfully launched from the ship-building yard of Messrs. Alexander McLaine and Son. The vessel is a beautiful model of shipbuilding. The following are her dimensions:—Length of keel and forerake, 156 feet; extreme breadth, 27 feet, 9 inches; depth, 18 feet 4 inches; tonnage, builders measurement, 572 tons; new measurement, 499 tons. She is intended for the China trade, and to be classed A 1 at Lloyd's, for 13 years.

The new steamer *Electric*, which is to ply between this port and Liverpool, arrived from the Clyde at a late hour last night. She is a magnificent vessel, fitted up with all modern improvements, and will, it is expected, prove one of the fastest plying across the channel.—*Ulster Observer*.

Michael Fitzgerald, P.P., Rathkeale, and Archdeacon of the diocese of Limerick, died yesterday morning at half-past 5 o'clock, at his residence in that town, after a tedious and lingering illness of near twelve months' duration, although at intervals the much esteemed and highly respected clergyman gave symptoms of improvement.
