

police were obliged to retreat, not, however, one of them had received some serious

Some took shelter in houses, and the stone-throwing at the "English emblem" still continued. The constabulary made their way to the barracks and got their rifles. They proceeded down the street to where the gas-works are, and, finding that the excitement still prevailed as much as before, they retired to near the market-house and loaded their fire-arms. The seven policemen then charged with bayonets the crowd, which consisted of about 1000 persons, and compelled them to retreat to Doherty's Hotel, wounding some of them.

Those of the constabulary who were obliged to take shelter in the neighbouring houses now went to the barracks, where they got their fire-arms, and the whole of the police patrolled the town until the crowd dispersed. The Sub-Inspector, Mr. G. Ryan, got two severe wounds on the head from a Sub-constable Dee who was also seriously hurt. Constable Murrough's rifle and scabbard were taken, and Sub-constable Mullany had his arm injured. In fact, nearly all the constabulary received some kind of wound. Informations were given the morning before P. C. Howley, Esq., R. M. Ryan, and a warrant issued for his arrest, was effected same day, for using threatening language to Constable M. Ryan. He is assistant clerk of the Tipperary Union, and was originally a pauper in a workhouse. Three civilians were injured. Edward Wall received a bayonet wound in the forehead, Patrick Ryan, two similar wounds in the leg; and a man named Kerr lost a finger. Some of the respectable inhabitants had to take shelter until the excitement had calmed down.

The City Record Court, yesterday, in the case of *John Darcy v. Darcy*, an action of assault and battery, returned a verdict of £5 for plaintiff, which, on appeal, was reversed. The Judge, Chief Justice Pigott, intimated he would certify for costs, if not true, as generally reported through this day, that the wife and son of Denis Dillane, who were convicted at our Assizes, had been arrested and committed to jail. The late Earl of Darnley had been convicted at Belfast Assizes, on circumstantial evidence, and sentenced to execution for the murder of Charles Wiligar, with a view to the execution of the same.
