We have to record another melancholy shipwreck. The vessel *Moorsfort*, Captain Coulthrust, with a crew of forty two men and four passengers, was on her homeward voyage from Calcutta, and called at St. Louis, Mauritius. On the 1st of February a storm arose and drove the vessel on a reef, and in a short time she was a total wreck. Thirty-one of the crew, including the captain and second officers were drowned, and the ship.

John Doyle, one of the jocks who rode at the last Tipperary races, died on Sunday from the effects of a fall he sustained when riding a horse called Dodger. An inquest was held on the body by Dr. Morrissy, coroner, and a verdict in accordance with the facts as recorded by the jury.

The Hon. George Augustus Hamilton Chichester, whose debts amounted to £11,000, without a figure of any kind on the other side, (not even a bad debt), obtained a free discharge in the London Court of bankruptcy on Thursday, and laughed heartily when sitting in the box.
