GENTLEMEN,—

HAVING been selected by Ballot, as a Candidate for the Town Councillorship of the Market Ward, at a public meeting of the Burgesses, convened on the 24th instant, I have in deference to the wishes of so intelligent and influential a body determined on placing my services at the disposal of my fellow-citizens in that Ward, and on co-operating with them, so far as lies in my power in any course of action they may deem advisable for the assertion and maintenance of public interests.
