

business of a publican and grocer at Honey-street, and in a house which is sly licensed, but in which business is carried on since last October. His client's transfer of his predecessor's license and for £30 in remodelling the premises, turned them into a respectable condition. He said that he had to inform Mr. Lynch through him his brother solicitor publicly, that the magistrates had decided immediately before the sitting and the question which was made the subject of serious consideration was this very night before it. The justices felt that so much and much immorality had spread and was spreading through this city, and the consequence of very serious crimes had been committed by persons acting under the pretext of intoxication. There were upwards of 300 public houses in the city, and this number had been determined to reduce, and in the city in which Mr. Doyle's client is in-licensed himself there were more public houses than the exigencies of the neighbourhood. But, independently of that consideration, had now 1,500 persons industriously employed in that very locality, and no other allowed to be established in it under the law and the permission of the justices, in whose sense benefit which the enterprising and bold man were conferring on the tradeless and industrious poor of the city. The justices determined to reduce those numbers down to 250, which is the maximum which will hereafter be allowed in the city, and therefore, turn their attention and their efforts to other lines of industry than the retail-trade, which has already caused so much trouble. He (the Mayor) was exceedingly sorry for his son, who is a respectable man, should be disappointed in his object, but the magistrates refused his application.

—There is a positive rule which must be observed and will not grant new licenses. Every one knows that the magistrates have come to a determination.

The number of public houses must be reduced because they were sowing broadcast the seeds of intemperance and demoralization amongst the people.

—The magistrates have come, as I have said, to a resolution which will not be departed from. No "traps" shall be allowed, and no licence in the neighbourhood of Mr. Tait's factory. Applications for new licenses were submitted, but refused, and the same reasons were given for their rejection.

—The magistrates, lately a publican in Lower Cecilia-street, at the suit of the Commissioners of the Excise, in the mitigated penalty of £5, for selling spirit as a "licensed retailer of spirits" over and over again, in fact he had not paid his license. At the instance of Mr. Lynch (sol.) the magistrates will recommend to their honours the Commissioners to have this penalty further reduced.
