Mr. P. Murphy stated the case, on the part of the Crown, which was shortly this:—The prosecutor, who is a labouring man, had £20 lodged in the Limerick Saving. Bank, and on the 2nd of April this money was drawn out by the prisoner. Patrick, who falsely represented himself to be Philip Collins.

Mr. Carte examined the prosecutor, who corroborated the circumstances stated by Mr. Murphy, and which already appeared in the Chronicle, in our report of the proceedings before the magistrates, by whom the case was sent for trial.
