SECOND PETTY JURY.

Patrick Collins was indicted for obtaining from the officers of the Limerick Savings' Bank the sum of £20, under false pretences, that money so obtained being the property of his uncle, Philip Collins.

The prisoner pleaded—Not Guilty.

Mr. P. Murphy stated the case, on the part of the Crown, which was shortly this:—The prosecutor, who is a labouring man, had £20 lodged in the Limerick Savings' Bank, and on the 2nd of April this money was drawn out by the prisoner, Patrick, who falsely represented himself to be Philip Collins.

Mr. Carte examined the prosecutor, who corroborated the circumstances stated by Mr. Murphy, and which already appeared in the CHRONICLE, in our report of the proceedings before the magistrates, by whom the case was sent for trial.

Mr. Hewson, of the Bank, proved the issuing of a new book to the prisoner, who alleged that he lost the original book, and also the payment of the money.

Mr. Horatio Seymour, Actuary of the Bank, proved the payment of the money on the new book; and, on his cross-examination by Mr. O'Donnell, stated that Mr. Hewson performed the most important business in the Bank, although he had the lowest salary, and if he looked for an advance he was most worthy of getting it, and he would do all that he could to obtain it for him.

Mr. Seymour stated that this money belonged to the officers of the Limerick Savings' Bank.

The Court said the Crown need not go further into that question, as a general intention to defraud was sufficient to sustain the indictment.

Mr. O'Donnell spoke to evidence on the part of the prisoner, and one witness of the labouring class was produced as to the character of the prisoner which he deposed to be good, and also that the prosecutor had left the handbook with him for eight days.

The judge charged the jury who retired, but after a couple of hours and more spent in consideration of the case came to the determination not to agree, and twice informed the court of this result, and were twice sent back. On their third appearance they also announced that they could not agree.

The learned chairman said—"If I did my duty I would send you back to your jury-room, there to remain until Monday morning. It is impossible to say that after the lengthened and patient investigation which this case has received, that you cannot form an opinion as to the prisoner's guilt or innocence—but as the case does not affect the peace of the country, I will allow you to be discharged, but the result of your conduct will be that he must remain in jail and take his trial at the assizes.

Mr. O'Donnell—Will your worship not allow him to stand out on bail.

Court—Indeed I will not—In such a case as this He must remain in custody.
