**SUSPICIOUS OCCURRENCE.**

An inquest took place to-day before John Gleeson, Esq. City Coroner, and a respectable jury, in Howlet's public house, Lower Harstonge-street, on the body of John Lynch, aged about 30 years, a porter employed in the goods department of the Waterford and Limerick Railway Company and whose body was found by Simon Riordan, dock watchman, in the river outside the floating dock. The tide was out and the body was lying on its back in the mud. Riordan gave the alarm to Constable O'Brien, of Henry-street station, who went down to the docks and had the body brought ashore. It appeared by the evidence that the deceased had been in company on the previous part of yesterday evening with James Dagg, head porter, Daniel Burke, and James Kelly, porters in the railway service, and had been drinking in Synan's public house where they gave a round each man so that each had four bottles to his share. They then adjourned to Hurley's public house where the deceased and Burk drank two half tumblers of punch each. The deceased went with Burke to John-street where the latter lives and arriving there Mrs Bourke was at the door and requested the deceased to go home at which request he smiled. Burke then accompanied by his wife went with the deceased as far as a lane called Palmerstown, in order to put him on the direct way home, as he lived in the New street, Ballinacorra. The deceased was not drunk, Burke said, for he was a steady, sober-going young man, and no one could ever know that he drank at all. Burke and his wife then parted with deceased, and did not see him alive afterwards. This was after 11 o'clock at night.

Constable O'Brien deposed that he was informed by Riordan that a body was in the river, and proceeded there and had the body brought ashore and had it searched, when there was only a shilling and a pen- knife found on it.

Henry Jacob, Esq., traffic superintendent, who attended the inquest for the purpose of ascertaining and looking after the morale of the men in the traffic department, said that yesterday was pay day, and that the deceased should have in his pocket after making deductions for the sick fund, 24s.

Mr. Patrick Kavanagh, who is in the employment of Mr. Hickey, iron monger, said that he was in George-street, about a quarter to 5 o'clock this morning, when he saw a poor looking man clapping his hands and shouting for a watchman, and bawling out that "two bad girls were after throwing a man into the river and there was no one to save him"; he (witness) then ran down Shannon-street and saw the tide out, and considering that it would be impossible to drown a man and the tide out and believing that the man did this to hoax the watchmen he took no further notice of the matter, but then when he heard that a man's body was found in the river the circumstances struck him forcibly and he mentioned it to several.

Constable O'Brien said that it was about this time he saw the body in the mud, and the tide was then out 40 yards at least, so that it would be impossible to drown a man then.

A young man who was in charge of a brigantine in the river, and near the spot where the body was found, said that he only dozed the whole night, and heard no noise, and that the least alarm would have aroused him.

There was no further evidence given, and the jury found an open verdict, that—"The deceased was found drowned in the river, outside the New Dock; but there was no evidence to show them how the deceased got there."

It was said by several parties who knew the deceased that he was a sober, steady, and well-conducted man.

The jurors complained of the neglected state of that portion of the river, upon which there was not a watchman. Many inquests had been held on parties drowned in that locality, and a watchman could not be found that could give the smallest information to the jury about any one of these melancholy circumstances.
