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redress.
Mrs. Shanahan, on being examined by Mr. Lynch, said that she lives in Nenagh, and came with her husband to Limerick on business; her husband was a little drunk; he had £20 5s 3d in notes and silver in a handkerchief in the bosom of his coat; applied for tickets at the office, but not getting them, went into the refreshment room where her husband had a bottle of porter; they then went and took their seat in a carriage; Griffin then came up and asked her husband for his ticket; her husband said he had none, but was able to pay for them, and put his hand into his side pocket to take out his money when Griffin seized him by the collar and dragged him out, and the money fell and scattered about; she then attempted to pick up the money, which fell in the carriage, when Griffin pulled her out also; Griffin then collared her husband and pushed him along the platform; she thought to rescue her husband when the other defendant, Freney, came up and threw her down on the flags and kicked her in the face and body, and only stopped when a gentleman asked him, “did he think it was a dog he was kicking?” they only recovered £6 17s of the money.

On her cross-examination by Mr. Ellard, she said that she had taken but one bottle of porter that day, and her husband had taken but one before he came to the railway and it made him tipsy, because he was only shortly after getting out of fever; she denied that she was drunk or tipsy; her eyes and her face were blackened.

Michael Hartigan, a railway employee, was examined on the part of the defendants, and he denied that Griffin dragged her husband he only removed him quietly from the carriage. The plaintiff and her husband were so drunk, he said, that they were unable to speak a word. Griffin only coaxed him out; the money fell about but it was all picked up and restored. Griffin brought the husband up the platform, but the wife came up and was dragging him away, when the guard, Mr. Freney, interfered and gave her a shove, when she fell.

A respectable man, who had been a spectator of a part of the scene, said that he saw Mrs. Shanahan attempt to pull her husband away from Griffin. Griffin then called for the guard, who coming up gave her a shove and threw her down. He would not say that the woman was drunk, but she decidedly was excited.

A man of the name of Patrick Prendergast was called, the oath was tendered, but when desired to “kiss the book,” he merely placed it on the point of his nose, and was accordingly turned off the table by the justices.

A young man, named Goulding, deposed that he saw Mrs. Shanahan pull the guard's whiskers, of which he has a large pair, and give him a *scraub* down the face, whereupon he gave her a kind of a twist and she fell on her hands and face, and he then gave her a sort of a *shove* with his foot.

Sub-constable Hogan, of the Boherbony station, said that Shanahan was drunk, and the wife was nearly as bad as her husband. On the next day when he saw her she had a black eye.

Constable Phelan, of the same station, deposed that Shanahan was tipsy, but he did not see the wife. Griffin handed him £2 9s. 11d.

Thompson Russell, Esq., said that he was one of those who was every morning and evening on the railway terminus, and he felt that it was only right to state that he always saw the two defendants discharge their duties efficiently and with good temper upon all occasions, and under most trying circumstances; they had always acted with the greatest propriety.

The Mayor, having consulted with his other magistrates, said—This subject is one of great importance to the public, and, therefore, the magistrates were at first of opinion that they should send the case for trial to another tribunal, and were it not for the expense such a course would entail on the parties the justices would have adopted it. This conduct should not pass unpunished, and the sentence of the court was that Griffin should pay a fine of 10s. with costs of court, and solicitor's costs, or be imprisoned with hard labour for 14 days; and Freney should pay a fine of 40s. with costs of court and solicitor's costs or to be imprisoned for a month with hard labour; and were it not added the Mayor, for the character given of them by Mr. Russell their punishment would be much more severe.

There were a few other assault cases of minor importance disposed of, and the court adjourned.

A gentleman extensively engaged in the linen manufacture, residing in Armagh, has received through post-office of that city a threatening letter, telling him to “inshure” his life for a large amount, which was named, as his death was meditated. The doomed gentleman gives extensive employment to weavers in Lurgan and Armagh.

—In order to point out the value of stimulants, we may remark that old Indians in Canada will with impunity suffer themselves to be bit by a rattlesnake, the most obnoxious of all the ophidians after drinking a pint of whiskey.
