COUNTY LIMERICK INFIRMARY.

A meeting of the directors of this institution was summoned for to-day, in order to hold an inquiry into certain alleged abuses which have crept into this establishment through the instrumentality of its nurses and servants. The members present were:—Alderman Mahony, (chairman), Thomas Boyse, Esq., High Sheriff, Dr. Parker, Dr. Gelston, and the Rev. Mr. Fitzgerald, P.P. of St. John's.

Doctor Gelston was unable to remain so as to take part in the investigation, having to attend a consultation at Barrington's Hospital in the case of the poor man whose leg was shattered this morning in the new sewer in Queen-street.

Mrs. Mary Day and son, were then examined, (not on oath) pro forma, as to her giving money to a nurse to take care of her son while in the hospital, and having to pledge her coat to raise the money for that purpose as stated by the High Sheriff in his speech at the corporation, and which statement she corroborated—other statements were made, and various circumstances mentioned which convinced the board that a full and searching enquiry was absolutely necessary, and as there was not a full attendance of members present it was resolved that fresh summonses should be issued to the members to attend a meeting on Friday next.

The latest news from Rosencrans' army on the Cumberland River reports all quiet there, and the men in good health and spirits.

NEW-YORK, 8TH JUNE—EVENING.—The report received on Saturday last that General Lee had evacuated Fredericksburg, and that Hooker had occupied that city was untrue. It appears that in consequence of the withdrawal of a Confederate brigade from Fredericksburg General Hooker on Friday afternoon, sent a division across the Rappahannock at Diep Run to reconnoitre this division; crossed in face of a heavy fire from the Confederate rifle pits on the opposite side; and after capturing 100 Confederates in the rifle pits, and ascertaining that Longstreet was there in force, they recrossed the river with a loss of 40 men. It is supposed Lee maintains his position at Fredericksburg, and that his movements were made to place his army in a more healthy situation. General Stewart arrived with from 12,000 to 15,000 Confederate cavalry at Culpepper on Saturday last.

Advices from Vicksburg are to 3rd inst. The siege operations continued. One division of General Grant's army was on the west side of Black River Bridge watching General Johnstone who appeared there on 1st and 2nd inst., with 5,000 troops, but afterwards retired.

General Johnstone is reported to have altogether 18,000 men, but no artillery.

Communication between Generals Grant and Banks is kept up along the Louisiana shore.

Southern journals assert that General Kirby Smith has defeated General Banks at Port Hudson.

The steamers America and Harmonia have arrived out.

NEW YORK 9, (Evening)—Per Asia—In the case of the "Dolphin" it has been decided that a vessel bound to Nassau with the intention of sailing from there to a blockaded port was equally liable to capture as if she was bound direct to a blockaded port. 66 cases of rifles and swords were found on board the "Dolphin" entered on the freight list as hardware. In the case of the steamer "Pearl" time was allowed to the claimants to produce further testimony, but it was decided, that vessels bound to convenient ports with the intention of making voyages from there to blockaded ports are subject to capture before their arrival at the ports from which they intend to sail for blockaded ports. 8 schooners are reported to have been captured in the Gulf.

NEW YORK, 10TH JUNE (Morning).—By Telegraph to Halifax—General Banks officially reports that the conduct of the negro troops has been heroic, and that there is no longer any doubt that the Government will find in the negroes effective supporters. Gen. Banks loss from the 3rd to the 30th ult., was 1,000 men, including many of his ablest officers.

General Sherman died at New Orleans.

Admiral Porter officially reports that another expedition had gone up the Zazoo river, which destroyed 9 Confederate transports. Admiral Porter adds that, with the exception of some few steamers beyond Fort Pemberton, the Confederates can now transport nothing on the Zazoo river.

The Philadelphia Enquirer says that the 2nd South Carolina negro regiment defeated the Confederates on the 3rd inst., at Pocotglis, and was holding the railroad bridge between Savannah and Charleston; reinforcements are being sent to them. It is reported Mr. Vallandigham has been imprisoned by the Confederates.
