Recovery of Stolen Property.—Some time back we reported that a burglary and robbery had been committed in the suburban residence of Peter Tait, Esq., from which several valuable articles of plate had been abstracted. The police were at once placed on the alert, but after the most energetic exertions on their part the search was given up and the mystery in which the affair was enveloped was allowed time to develop, and time has in fact dissolved it.—On Tuesday last, a Mr. Clancy, who had a field of barley situate in the vicinity of the plundered residence, finding it ripe for the sickle placed some reapers in it to cut it down, and about the middle of the day and in about the centre of the field they came upon a large parcel tied up in a linen cloth, and having opened it they discovered its contents to be the several articles of plate which had been stolen some weeks ago. The articles were uninjured and were at once restored to their owner who rewarded the finders with his wonted liberality.

Inquest.—John Gleeson, Esq., city coroner, held an inquest yesterday in Frederick-street, on view of the body of a poor labouring man of the name of Timothy Daly, who was accidentally deprived of life by the slipping of a bank composed of huge stones and earth, underneath which he was employed quarrying for limestone, at Corbally. The deceased was about 60 years of age. He was struck on the temple by a massive stone, and never spoke after he received the fatal blow, and expired in about ten minutes. The jury found a verdict in accordance with the facts.

Accidents.—A poor labouring man of the name of James Haurahan, who had been assisting a mason at the old gas house, fell from the scaffold, and severely contused his ankle. He was admitted into Barrington's hospital where medical aid was at once administered to him. A young girl of the name of Catherine Neiland, aged 14 years, was playing with some comrades on the timber at the docks, when one of the beams turned on her leg, and smashed it between the knee and the ankle. She was also admitted to the hospital, where the remedies usually resorted to on all such occasions were at once applied, and she is now progressing favorably.

Bridget Kitchiner, a child of about two years old, living with her parents in Old Broad-street, was rolled over by a country car, and had her hip dislocated. The owner of the car has been held to bail to answer for the result of his culpable negligence.

A very handsome monument has been erected in the Parish Church of Mullingar to the memory of the late Captain R. Swift, of the 65th Regiment.

A draft of five officers and forty-five men of the 43rd have received orders for immediate embarkation to join the service companies of the regiment in New Zealand.

On Monday the examination for the army medical service began at Chelsea. The examination is conducted in the old dining hall in which the late Duke of Wellington lay in state, and which, from that time, has ceased to be used as the mess room for the pensioners.

His Royal Highness the Field Marshal Command-in-Chief having selected Colonel H. P. Goodenough, now commanding the Royal Artillery in Cork district, to take charge of the party of officers about to proceed on the annual professional foreign tour, that officer has been directed to proceed to England, and the command of the Royal Artillery in the Cork district will devolve upon Colonel Desborough, Royal Artillery, on his return to Ballincollig from the Carragh.

Private Cooper, Coldstream Guards, who was accidentally shot on the 21st ultimo, at Wimbledon, died there yesterday, at six o'clock. He was making favourable recovery, as regarded the wounded side, until Friday night, when symptoms of congestion of the lung on the south side became evident. These gradually increased in intensity, and he sank without pain.

Vice Admiral Drake died on Saturday last, at Bath. He was on the retired list, and was born in December, 1788.
