THE PORT OF LIMERICK.

In reply to a letter from Mr. James Spaight, enforcing the necessity of actively and energetically enforcing the claims of the harbour on the Lords of Treasury, Francis W. Russell, Esq., M.P., has forwarded to Mr. Spaight the following reply:—

"London, 28th Nov., 1864.
"MY DEAR JAMES—I received this morning the Memorial to the Treasury of the Harbour Commissioners, signed by you as chairman of a meeting of their body, held on Friday, 25th inst. This document is admirably drawn up, and represents in language as forcible and lucid, as it is unfortunately too true, the deplorable state into which the Trade of Limerick has been gradually falling in consequence of the impolitic and unjust contributions levied on her sea-going commerce.

MEXICO AND THE UNITED STATES.

The Post's City Article says:—It has been stated, on good authority, that the Washington Cabinet is disposed to recognise the Mexican Empire, and that Mr. Seward will bring a proposition to that effect before Congress.

THE BRAZIL MAILS.

The R.M.S. "Oneida" with the Brazil mails arrived here this morning with 72 passengers, £53,142 in specie and a general cargo. She experienced strong No other gales throughout the passage.

Buenos Ayres continued to progress under the administration of General Mitre. Gold had been discovered in large quantities in San Juan, at the foot of Cordallera Mountain. Over 500 ozs. were obtained in nuggets in one day by two miners. Hostile measures had been taken by the Brazilian authorities to enforce their claims on the Government of the Beuda Oriental. The blockade of Monte Video by a Brazilian squadron had been declared and a division of the Brazilian army has crossed the frontier and advanced into the Oriental territory as far as Ceiro Largo.

Flores had arrived at Monte Video with 3,000 men, but retired without attempting to take the city.

The U. S. Minister at Rio De Janeiro, General Webb, has disavowed the proceedings of the Wassachussetts in the port of Bahia, and has promised on the part of the Government that full satisfaction will be given to the Brazilian authorities. This promise was held worthy of little credit. The prorogation of the Bankruptcy Court for 60 days expired on the 9th ult., and many failures were expected which would have to be subjected to the tedious and costly process of the court.

MONETARY AND COMMERCIAL.

The failure is announced of Messrs. Wilson Bowles and Co., respectable East India and general merchants of Mincing-lane. The total liabilities are about £250,000, but the direct engagements do not exceed £60,000, and it is thought that the estate will pay about 15s. in the pound. The stoppage is said to have been partly caused through a considerable amount of produce belonging to Messrs. Bowles and Co. having been improperly dealt with by a member of a respectable firm of brokers, without the knowledge of his partners.

The discount demand at the Bank was of an average character, and in the open market there was some activity, as the payment of the 4th of the month falls due on the 3rd. The report of the Peninsular and Oriental Steam Company recommends the usual dividend of 3½ per cent., with an additional payment of 2 per cent., and an appropriation of 1½ per cent. from the underwriting account, making a total of 7 per cent.

A further dividend of 1s. in the pound has been announced to be paid by the official liquidation of the Northumberland and Durham District Bank, making the aggregate amount of dividend 19s. 6d. in the pound.
