On Monday, March 7th, 1864, at his house, Maenoline, near Newcastle, at the advanced age of 107 years, Mr. Edmund Dore (or Dower); and at the same place, a few years ago, his brother, Mr. Maurice Dore (or Dower), aged 103 years. Both these men lived on the same farm on which their father, their grandfather, and great-grandfather lived for the last 300 years, and, as far as tradition goes, long, long before the Devon put the Desmond out of this vast tract of property. The early character of the family, which old Edmund Dore (or Dower) carried to his grave and left few, indeed, to inherit, was one that a relative may be proud of. His strict sense of honour, love of truth, and sterling honesty in all transactions through life, made Edmund Dower's word Edmund Dower's bond. A hatred and fear of scandal, either to utter or listen to, a nobleness of soul, the true stamp of old nobility, did Edmund Dower bring with him from his father and from his mother, and carry with him to-day to his grave. This article is written by a distant relative, old enough to know, to witness, to love, and to respect his virtues. His remains were followed to their last resting place at Moneagay old churchyard, on Wednesday, by a numerous and respectable body of friends, relatives, and admirers of his truth and worth, but unattended by that false adornment of foolish fashion and empty pride, too often the cloak to sham grief and empty sympathy.
