**SPANISH FINANCE.**

The *Times* says the daily advices from Madrid confirm the knowledge that the finance minister was on the eve of acceding to the just requirements of the English and French creditors, when he was enabled by the loan from the three London houses again to perpetuate the degradation of his country. It is understood that proceedings are about to be taken in Bankruptcy to arrest the securities transmitted by the Bank of Spain to London under the arrangements for the recent loan, and a portion of which belongs by law to the bondholders. It is also affirmed that the committee of bondholders intend on all occasions to adopt similar steps into whatever hands such securities may fall.
