## DEATH OF WILLIAM H. HALL, ESQ.

We deeply regret to announce the death, in Dublin, this morning, of William H. Hall, Esq., of the Crescent, in this city, for which sad event his family and friends had been almost prepared owing to the daily intelligence received in Limerick since Friday last, as to the certainty of his fast approaching dissolution. Mr. Hall was a native of Cork, but in his capacity of sole agent here to the very extensive and valuable house property of David Leahy Arthur, Esq., has been a constant resident in Limerick for the last 35 years, and where, we believe, every one of his children were born. About eleven years since the late Mr. Hall filled the office of Mayor of this ancient city, and discharged the duties of Chief Magistrate with remarkable zeal and upright integrity, having at the close of his official duties received the warm thanks of the corporation and citizens at large. By the numerous tenantry here who held under the muchlamented gentlemen his loss will be irreparably felt. as he was at all times willing and obliging, ever ready to attend to their household requirements in the way of decorations and repairs, which system led to most beneficial results, and afforded general satisfaction. By this means a large amount of employment was constantly afforded to a numerous class of tradesmen and artisans. The remains of deceased are expected to arrive here to-morrow for interment. The Corporation meeting which was to have been held to-day, was adjourned by the Council in consequence of Mr. Hall's death. Mr W. H. Hall was Manager in this city from the period of its establishment, until very recently, of the Union Bank, (when appointed local adviser), and as we have more than once stated, conduced, by his amiabiltiy of manner, and exreme courtesy, to place it upon a good foundation, his mode of doing business having proved satisfactory and accommodating to our trading and mercantile interests. much-lamented gentleman was also agent over a large estate in this county. His age was 66 years.
