THE LATE WILLIAM H. HALL, ESQ.

The remains of this sincerely lamented gentleman,  
whose death we announced on Thursday evening, ar-  
rived at the railway terminus in this city on to-day,  
per the half past one train from Dublin, and were met  
by his relatives and friends, and also by a large number  
of his tenantry, tradesmen, and labourers. The Right  
Worshipful the Mayor, attended by the civic officers,  
wearing crape, and having the maces muffled, and  
accompanied by nearly all the members of the Town  
Council wearing the same emblem of mourning  
were present, to evince their united respect for the  
remains of a man who was beloved by all classes.  
Many of our most respectable fellow citizens, not of  
the Corporation, were also in attendance at the  
terminus, and joined in the funeral procession.  
The carriages of many of the gentry of the city and  
county were also in the mournful procession. The
