FROM OUR LONDON CORRESPONDENT.

A plain, straightforward Budget is a very satisfactory sort of thing in these days of speculation. A remission of something over a million of income tax, and the reduction of the sugar duties, are advantages which outweigh the disadvantage of an absence of brilliant originality in Mr. Gladstone's last statement. For all the favors which we receive at the hands of so arbitrary a functionary as a Chancellor of the Exchequer we are of course all extremely thankful; but, nevertheless, a great many individuals went down to the House last Thursday night who did not care very much whether the tax collector when he called next time would want a few pounds more or less, and who came away rather disappointed. As my readers have doubtless learnt by this time there was a dense crowd in the House on the Budget night. Party expecta-tions were screwed up to a painful extent, and the famous leaders, Lord Palmerston and Lord John Russell, were attentive auditors beneath the same roof with the equally famous leaders of the Opposi-tion, Lord Derby and Mr. Disraeli, and they were listening to a man who is less of a party man pro-bably than any individual present—to an orator, and one of the deepest thinkers of the age. If the results were not astounding the sight was not to be

easily erased from the tablets of the memory. I happened to be in the gallery of the House of Commons on the evening when Mr. Bernal Osborne put his question on Dano German affairs to the Prime Minister. There was a full house, as there generally is when a ministerial statement is expected, and the only absentee of any note, as far as I could see, was Mr. Disraeli. I looked to the front Opposition bench, on which he generally sits, but the anxious face, check trowsers, and eye-glass were not there. Mr. Mr. Osborne has been termed the House of Commons buffoon, but he is in reality the wit of the assembly. No one who is at all familiar with his power of mimicry, his ready answer, or his fine commanding form would apply the former epithet to him. Members invariably and involuntarily smile when he rises, and dispose themselves to trifle more cosily on their benches, well satisfied, by their demeanour, that the tedium of ordinary business is to be relieved. On Friday night he was not quite so happy as usual, but succeeded in eliciting certain "cheers and laughter" in the course of his remarks. And then Lord Palmerston rose. Directly the well polished hat was removed from the trimly arranged white hair the ministerialists cheered triumphantly. Turning towards his supporters and glancing at Mr. Osborne, who sat on the bench, the Premier began his reply. Unfortunately it cannot be denied—it was to be expected in the ordinary course of events-that the noble lord gets feeble and weak daily. As he sits, he looks extremly aged; but when standing his form presents a sad contrast to that tall commanding one we were so familiar with a year or two ago. In his speech, too, the noble lord evidently fails. He stammers, stops short, is at a loss for words, and sometimes even repeats whole sentences. It was with pain that I saw this the other evening, but with pleasure that I saw the House reverently—almost affectionately—applaud this fine old English gentle-The expected cheer is never denied to him by his supporters, and his lordship only has to smile to put the House in good humour. As I came out of the House I was surprised to see a belated figure in a very long coat, and tremendous boots, issue out of the side entrance for members. In a moment after two other members came out and Lord Palmerston, putting an arm within each of his friends, trudged manfully home to Cambridge House. It was really wonderful to see this splendid old man set off at two in the morning for a walk home-disdaining cab or carriage—and chatting on the events of the hour.
