INQUEST.—An inquest was held on Tuesday, on the body of Mrs. Richard Laffan, of Ion, in this county, before Thomas Costelloe, Esq. Mr. Richard Laffan, husband of the deceased, being duly sworn, deposed that his wife was ailing since Friday week; she often complained of a pain in her side and palpitation of her heart; she refused medical advice on this occasion, as she had often done before, and sent for an unprofessional person, who attended her; he took two cups-full of blood from one arm first, and, since, he took another cupful from the other arm; he also applied a blister over her right side; this appeared to ease her; on Monday morning, when I was getting up, I noticed her try three times to cough, and, when I noticed something wrong, I went to raise her up, and shook her; I knew then she was nearly dead, and called up my son, William; but when he came in, which was in about two minutes, she was dead.—The next witness called was Dr. Michael J. Cahalan, Medical Officer of the Caherconlish Dispensary, who, being duly sworn, deposed that he examined the body of the late Mrs. Richard Laffan. He was of opinion that she died from disease of the heart. He was then asked his opinion about the treatment adopted, and he said—I cannot be positive whether such treatment was judicious or not, as I never got an opportunity of knowing the deceased either during her illness or lifetime. The jury returned a verdict—"Died by the visitation of God.
