The County Coroner, Thomas Costelloe, Esq., held an inquest on yesterday on the body of Own M'Cluskey. who committed suicide in the workhouse infirmary, by cutting his throat, as stated in our report of the poor-law proceedings on yesterday. The jury found that when the deceased committed the act he was

labouring under temporary insanity.

A poor young woman of the name of Mary Hurley, aged 23 years, died on Sunday last in the county in firmary, of that fearful visitation of Providence which is known in sacred and prophane history as "leprosy' but which is unknown, thank God, in this country, even by medical men except by theory. She lived with her aunt, and was in the habit of acting as laundress for the sailors who visit this port, and it is presumed that she must have contracted the frightful disease by coming in contact in the way of her laborious calling, with some article in which the disease was, and which was thus conveyed into her system. She was a month ill before admitted into hospital, and she remained five months there carefully and unremittingly attended by the medical gentlemen attached to it, and by the nurse under whose care she was placed, and who should have their faces muffled when attending her. The fearful malady spread over her whole body which became, to use the words of our informant, like a corrupting corpse.
