At his residence in Thomondgate, on Saturday night, aged 74 years, Alderman Patrick Mulcahy, representative of the Castle Ward, which position he filled with satisfaction to his constituents, and the entire approbation of the citizens at large, since the reformed Corporation was established. As a mercantile man—"one of the people"—he was esteemed and respected. He made their interests his own from the earliest period of his life, and as fortune favoured him in business, not only his purse, but his exertions were available at all times of distress or sickness. In the never to be forgotten year of 1832, when cholera first broke out in this city, and made dreadful havoc amongst the population, he was one of the most laborious and hard-working members of the local boards of health. In his own neighbourhood he was looked up to by all for advice, and the wise counsel he gave always proved beneficial. The loss of so truly honest, consistent, blunt, and straightforward a gentleman will be very much felt in Limerick. His remains were yesterday interred in the cemetery of St. Laurence, the Mayor and Corporation attending the funeral, the cortege being large and respectable.
