On the 12th inst., at Kilpeacon Rectory, after a long illness,  
 in the 52nd year of his age, the Rev. William Newcombe  
 Willis, Prebendary, and Vicar Choral of Limerick Cathedral,  
 and late one of the Honorary Secretaries of the Limerick  
 Protestant Orphan Society, to which charitable institution,  
 as well as to other works of Christian benevolence, both  
 public and private, he devoted all his energies. In the cause  
 of the orphan he was well trained, having served with its able  
 founder, the late Rev. Godfrey Massey, whose spirit he seemed  
 to have caught up, and with the Rev. John Elmes, Vicar of  
 St. John's, united with untiring zeal for many years to for-  
 ward the objects of that excellent local charity. In his  
 private capacity Mr. Willis was equalled by few men for  
 amiability of disposition, and was always held in high esteem  
 by his brother clergymen of the diocese, by whom he is much  
 regretted. His remains will be interred on Wednesday next,  
 in the family vault, St. Mary's Cathedral.
