The Clerk called the names, when only Mr. Rogers, Dr. Wilson, and Mr. Porter, answered.
A call was made that Mr. Rogers should leave the chair till his successor should be appointed.
The Clerk—The last Moderator is the person to take it.
Dr. Cooke then came on the platform to take the chair, and was loudly cheered by the parties in the gallery.
The Moderator—I want to know is it the rule and law of the Church that I should leave the chair till my successor is appointed? I do not intend to vote.
Under these circumstances, it was decided that there was no necessity for Mr. Rogers leaving the chair.
Dr. Wilson (Limerick) said that, having been nominated by two Presbyteries of the Church for the Moderatorship, he claimed their attention for a few moments, while he stated the reasons why he declined the office on the present occasion. He was not unwilling to serve the Church either at home or abroad, and he trusted he would never refuse such a claim when made upon him; but it was plain there was a general feeling in the Church that their present Moderator should be re-elected. It was not for him to say why such was the feeling, but it was plain that it was so; and he felt satisfied that the brethren thought the necessities of the Church demanded it. It had been his privilege to be associated with their present Moderator during the past year in connexion with some of the arrangements of their General Assembly, both in connexion with missionary operations and other business of the Church, and he could safely say he never knew a man who had discharged his duty with greater fidelity. He begged to withdraw in favour of Mr. Rogers. (Loud applause).
Rev. Mr. Porter (Donagheady) also begged leave to withdraw, as, when he was nominated by his Presbytery, he said he would not stand in opposition to Mr. Hall or Mr. Rogers, and he was of the same mind still. He begged, therefore, to ask the leave of the house that he might withdraw his name.
The Clerk called the names of Mr. Hall and Mr. M'Alister, and, there being no response, he said that as Mr. Porter and Dr. Wilson had retired, there was no nomination before the house but that of Mr. Rogers (loud applause, and hisses from a corner of the gallery).
Dr. Barnett—When did the practice commence of allowing the people to withdraw their names?
Mr. Breaky—Dr. Cooke retired in favour of the late Dr. Johnston.
The Clerk—The only two candidates who were present have retired, and the only name before us is our present Moderator. (Applause and hisses, and shouts of "No, no;" "Yes, yes.")
Rev. Mr. Berkeley (Lurgan) said he felt a very solemn responsibility, and he felt that with the proceeding that was about to take place he could in no way coincide, and, as the other candidates had not come forward, he moved that the Rev. Dr. Glasgow be elected as Moderator of the General Assembly.
Dr. Knox said it was an erroneous impression of the Clerk, that, because Mr. Hall and Mr. M'Alister had left the house, they had withdrawn.
The Clerk said Mr. M'Alister and Mr. Hall were aware they had been nominated, and they had left the house, and had not answered to the call made upon them.
After some discussion,
The house divided on the motion of the Rev. Dr. Cooke, that the candidates who had been nominated by the Presbyteries should not be permitted to withdraw their names, or, in other words, that Mr. Rogers was not the only candidate.
The Clerk called the roll—
For Dr. Cooke's motion, 99
Against, 187
Majority, —88
The announcement was received with loud and long continued applause.
The Clerk—There is therefore no other candidate, and Mr. Rogers is consequently elected (loud applause).
