WILL OF THE LATE EARL OF CLARE.—The will of
the Right Hon. Richard Hobart FitzGibbon, Earl of
Clare, of Mount Shannon, Limerick, and of Kensing-
ton Palace Gardens, was proved in her Majesty's
Court of Probate by the Right Hon. John Lord
Wodehouse (the son-in-law) and the Rev. Henry Hely
Hutchinson, of Charleton Glebe, Wilts, two of the
executors—a power being reserved to his relict, the
Countess of Clare. The personality was sworn under
£90,000. His lordship was the second son of the first
earl, Lord High Chancery of Ireland. He succeeded
his brother as third earl in 1851; was formerly a
colonel in the army, and served in the Peninsula; re-
presented Limerick 1818-41; and was lord lieutenant
for that county, and colonel of the Limerick militia.
His lordship died, on the 10th of January last, at the
age of sixty-nine, having executed his will in 1855,
with three codicils in 1856-7. To the countess he
has bequeathed a life interest over the bulk of his
property, confirming the provisions made in favour of
his daughters, and leaving the residue of his property,
on the decease of the countess, to his daughter, Lady
Elinor Cavendish. His books and prints will revert
to his grandson and godson, Reginald Cavendish.

Baron Deasy opened the assizes for the county of
Kilkenny on Wednesday, and in his remarks to the
grand jury, congratulated them on the condition of
the county. Only 33 offences had been committed
since last assizes. In 11 of these the parties declined
to prosecute, and for the other offences 18 persons
had been arrested. His lordship was of opinion that
there was no remissness in detecting crime upon the
part of the constituted authorities. Mr Justice
O'Brien, in his address to the city grand jury, spoke
favourably of the state of the county.

The Judges of Assize and their Registrars were
entertained on Thursday night at dinner by the
members of the Leinster Bar, at the Clubhouse Hotel,
Kilkenny.

Judges Monaghan and Keogh left Cork on yester-
day morning, by the 10 a.m. train, en route for Dublin.
They were escorted to the Cork terminus by a body of
mounted police.

trial at the Carrick-on-Suir petty Sessions. Some
copies of an oath of allegiance to the Irish republic,
of willingness to take up arms on its behalf at a
moment's warning and of obedience to superior
officers, were found in his possession, and read at the
preliminary investigation. The magistrates in com-
mitting him, said they were acting under the advice
of the Solicitor-General.
