THE RUMOURED DISSOLUTION OF PARLIAMENT.—In reference to the rumoured dissolution, our London correspondent says:—"With regard to our domestic matters it is finally settled that all the predictions of people who have said that Parliament is to be dissolved before the year is out is simply erroneous. Lord Palmerston, Mr. Gladstone has told us, has been very silent on the subject, and this silence is expressive of the fact that we shall hear nothing of a dissolution until the autumn of next year."

The Marquis of Ailesbury and family have left Powerscourt House, Enniskerry, for England, after visiting the Viscount and Viscountess Powerscourt.

The Marquis and Marchioness of Kildare have arrived at Dublin, from England.

The Hon. Mrs. Forbes has arrived in Dublin from Castle Forbes.

The Right Rev. Lord Plunket has arrived at the Palace, Tuam, from Tourna-keady.

A marriage is arranged between Lieut.-Colonel Stapleton, commanding the right wing of the 32nd Regt., at present stationed in Waterford, and Lady Barbara Leeson, eldest daughter of the Earl and Countess of Miltown.

The terminus of the Kilrush and Kilkee railway is to be at the pier where the steamers disembark passengers. This will completely do away with the "Jarvies," and release travellers from their annoyance.

INQUEST.—Yesterday an inquest was held in John's Square, by the City Coroner, John Gleeson, Esq., on view of the remains of Daniel O'Keeffe the bricklayer, whose death by accident we reported in last Tuesday evening's CHRONICLE. The jury found a verdict in accordance with the facts, which demonstrated that the death was the result of accident.

There are now to be seen at Mr. John Abraham's Seed Warehouse, 8, George-street, some specimens of a new variety of swede turnips, 3 roots of which weigh 60 lbs., grown for Sir Edward Fitzgerald, Bart., from seed procured at the above establishment, and Mr. Barry, the intelligent agriculturist at Carrigoran, states the crop will average 50 tons per acre, showing what a good seed can produce even in so adverse a season as the past has been for this particular crop.

THE WEATHER.—For the last four days the weather has been exceedingly wet, with sharp frost at intervals, and rather strong winds, all foreboding a wintry aspect. With next change of moon a return of dry cold weather is expected.

It having been deemed advisable to demolish the existing works of defence of the Upper Shannon, it is also in contemplation to dismantle the several land works at Athlone, and to substitute in place of them a movable battery of the heaviest nature of rifled guns.

On Tuesday, Lady Castlerosse laid the foundation stone of a new Roman Catholic Church at Molahiffe, within seven miles of Killarney. The Right Rev. Dr. Moriarty, R.C.B., and a number of the clergy of the diocese attended; Viscount Castlerosse was also present, and is reported to have expressed his gratification at the wide spread of the Roman Catholic religion throughout the world.

The Earl of Buchan has, it is said, joined the communion of the Roman Church.

THE UNION BANK OF IRELAND.—Mr. Nicholas Dunscombe, of Kingswilliamstown, writing to a Cork contemporary says—"I claim for the establishment the high honour of having effectually ploughed up the fallow ground of Banking, and thus of being the means of conferring a great and lasting public good on Ireland. No portion of our funds is used out of Ireland. To support and foster Irish industry and enterprise the Union Bank of Ireland was founded, on these it is dependant for its profit, and from being purely an Irish bank it will not depart. "The Union Bank of Ireland" has ample means of affording every accommodation to its customers, having a working capital of £22 per share paid-up on 10,000 issued shares, and beyond question the capabilities of a bank for a mercantile accommodation must be measured by its paid up capital and not on its deposits, the latter being liable to be withdrawn at any time—The guiding star of "the Union Bank of Ireland" is Irish industry, and that alone."

Patrick Flanagan, an assistant in working the engine at the Graving Dock in Belfast, while engaged oiling the machinery on Tuesday night, was caught therein—his brains were scattered about and his body torn to pieces.

It is a fortunate circumstance that it was to the ears of a German clergyman Muller confessed his guilt. Had it been to an Englishman, even though he were Archbishop of Canterbury himself, the Germans would have at least affected to believe that no such confession was made. As it is, many of them say that the worthy doctor was so nervously excited at the awful moment that he could not have gathered or remembered the words of the culprit, or even their purport; and they ask with some show of reason how the doctor gathered that, because Muller said he done the deed, therefore he meant to convey that he alone was concerned in it. Much credit is due to Dr. Cappel for the truly christian part he acted from the moment Muller was sentenced until he was launched into eternity.

The remains of Mountford Longfield, Esq., D.L., of Castlemary, were interred on Saturday morning, at 11 o'clock, in the old family vault in Cloyne Cathedral. His remains were borne to the grave by the tenantry and labourers of his extensive estate, the cortege extending more than a mile and a half.

The Bishop of Orleans, now in Paris, came on purpose to celebrate the marriage of a deaf and dumb couple, both belonging to rich and noble families. The bridegroom is a count and the bride is a Mlle. Champagny, the daughter of an author of reputation whose ancestor received a title from Napoleon I.

Two men returning from the fair of Cavan on Tuesday, had a quarrel upon the road, when both went into a field to fight. The result was that one of them named John M'Mahon, was killed by his adversary, named Michael Conolly, who has absconded.

Master Samuel Rodger, youngest son of Mr Rodger, of Bridgelands, Selkirk, was accidentally shot dead by his cousin, on Saturday, while both were engaged shooting rabbits in a plantation.

Jane M'Kay, aged 22 years, nursery maid in the family of Dr. Gascoigne, South Camp, Aldershot, has met her death by burning, an extended crinoline having caused her dress to take fire.
