He was repeatedly cautioned by the bench not to go back from his former information; he refused to identify either of the

object of the attack, swore that he was not of Ryan's house, where he was in custody on the night in question; he would not tell Ryan to go back; it was not the best of his belief; but would not swear positively that it was his voice he heard at his house and hid himself; he was one of the men who came to look at the prisoners before this occurrence to mind the prisoners for a long time, but he was taken as to McDonogh's voice; he was the best of his belief.
