We have this evening to record the death of the Right Rev. Dr. Ryan, Roman Catholic Bishop of this diocese, which took place at his residence, Parkhouse, yesterday morning, to the deep regret of all classes, to whom he was endeared by a life dedicated to their service, during a period of half a century. The deceased prelate, who was in his 83rd year, was consecrated bishop on the 11th December, 1825, and for 30 years discharged the sacred duties of his calling to the entire satisfaction of his clergy and his flock.
