David MacNeal, mate of the barque Caroline, of Ardrossan, summoned his captain, Richard Crawford, for £6 wages due to him.
The plaintiff, through his solicitor, Mr. Howard, complained that he had been discharged by the defendant without a month's notice, which he was required by Act of Act of Parliament to give to every seaman while on a voyage.
Mr. M'Donnell contended, on the part of the defendant, that the plaintiff was not entitled to money which he had not earned.
The Court, however, overruled the objection, holding that the Act of Parliament was in direct favour of the plaintiff, and decreed the defendant to pay his ex-mate £6, and solicitor's costs.
Michael Spain, John Thompson, and Pat Cassidy, were fined 1d. and costs, and 5s. each compensation, to Private John Kennedy, of the 2nd 9th, whom they assaulted, knocked down, and kicked, tearing his tunic, and rendering it unfit for further use, or in default of payment, 14 days imprisonment each, with hard labour.

There were sixteen cases disposed of, as follows:—
Michael and Adam Baker, for cutting branches off ash trees. Dismissed on non appearance.
Thomas M'Nolan, a road contractor, for wilfully letting water off the public road into complainant's land, defendant having a contract to form a gullet across the road to convey the water away. Case dismissed.
Thady Clancy was fined £1 and £1 costs, or two months' imprisonment, for an assault on Mary Clancey.
Daniel Hogan was fined 5s and 1s 6d costs, or one week's imprisonment, for assaulting Bridget Moloney, the wife of a caretaker of Eyre Lloyd's, Esq., J.P., who was preventing defendant from pulling and stealing grass, for which latter offence he was also fined 1s and 1s 6d costs, or one week.
Kate Nestor was charged by Constable Thompson with begging on the public street, but was discharged, on being admonished, and promising to go into the workhouse.
A man named William Fitzgerald, of Manister, was fined 10s and 1s costs, for having eighteen trout in his possession, at Rathkeale, on the 5th inst., it being close season.

The Governor of one of the large London prisons is on the "run," a warrant for his apprehension being out for extensive embezzlement.
In Cork an annual rate of 3d in the pound is about being struck as a "public water rate," and 6d in the pound as a "domestic water rate."
Lieut. James M'Gill has been dismissed from the United States army (11th West Virginia Infantry), for conduct unbecoming an officer and a gentleman, by keeping in his quarters a female, dressed in male attire! Col. H Potter, 7th New York Volunteers, has been also dismissed, for complicity in attempting to defraud a soldier of his bounty.
General and Mrs. Tom Thunb have arrived in Paris, and are staying at the Hotel du Louvre, where they receive select visitors.
CHRISTMAS GESE.—Twenty-eight geese were stolen on Sunday night from a farmer in Castleisland, Kerry. On Tuesday Constable Fennell found 23 of them in the possession of a feather dealer in Tralee, who has been made amenable till the production of the thief.
Captain Bass (Bass and Co.) will offer himself as a candidate for Stafford, in the Conservative interest, in opposition to one of the present members—the Liberal. The Earl of Shrewsbury has promised his support.
Mr. Williams, M.P., for Lambeth, is dead. He was ever vigilant in scrutinizing the government estimates for the public service.
A person living in Ballymena is committed for trial for forging two bills of exchange on the Northern Banking Company—one for £267 1s 11d, the other for £262 1s 11d. An official in the same town is a defaulter to the extent of £700, it is rumoured, in connection with the Provincial Bank.
Mace, the pugilist, who failed to come to "the scratch" with Coburn, at Good's Cross, last October, has instituted proceedings against the stakeholder, who paid away to the contributors the £500 subscribed by them, on his behalf, for the fight.
Joe Coburn, since his return from this country, has quietly resumed his residence in New York. It is understood that he is ready to fight any man now, as ever, but declines to do so for a less sum than 10,000 dollars.
