

The Jury found a verdict for the plaintiff on all the issues, except two, and assessed the damages at sixpence.

The Judge respited immediate execution.

THE RECENT RIOTS.

Mr. James Murphy applied yesterday on behalf of the 17 persons now in custody on a charge of being concerned in the riots which took place in this city on the evening of the 29th June, to have their trial postponed until the next assizes. He read in support of his application an affidavit made by the attorneys for the prisoners, who deposed that the riot had only taken place on last Wednesday week, that the prisoners had been since in custody, and had been unable to go about in search of the necessary evidence for their defence.

Messrs. W. W. Brereton, Q.C. and De Moleyns, Q.C. on behalf of the Crown, most strenuously opposed the application. The city had been for several hours in the hands of the rioters, great damage had been done, and it was of the utmost importance that justice should not be delayed. If this application were granted, it would be sufficient for any prisoner charged with an offence to say that he had been kept in custody since its commission, and was unable to go personally to search for evidence in his favour. There was no pretence in this case that any of the witnesses required resided out of the city, and the ends of justice would be amply satisfied by allowing a delay of the trial to a later period of the assizes.

His Lordship thought the fact of the prisoners having been detained in custody, and the short period which had elapsed since the alleged riot, afforded sufficient grounds for postponing the trial to the next quarter sessions, and the magistrates should admit the prisoners to bail in proper amounts in the mean time.

The parties against whom true bills were found by the City Grand Jury for rioting on the night of last Thursday week, were allowed by Judge Ball to stand out on bail, which he measured at £5 each, with two sureties of £2 10s each, to take their trials at the next October quarter sessions. They are directed to give bail before his Worship the Mayor.

SPECIAL JURY CASE.

Carmody, v. Waterford and Limerick Railway.
Mr. Heron, Q.C., applied to his Lordship to have the special jury summoned in this case, sworn and liberty given them to proceed to the place where the cause of action arose, in order to have a view of it. This was an action brought against the Company for the alleged improper construction of a drain under the railway by reason of which the plaintiff's land was flooded, and it was therefore that he (Mr. Heron) would ask his Lordship to allow the jury to proceed and view the premises. He (Mr. Heron) had been at them this morning; it would not take more than a quarter of an hour to get there and another quarter of an hour to return, and a half hour would suffice the jury to take a view.

The Court said that this would be a good way in which to put the jury in possession of the nature of the case. By an inspection they could understand the case. The jury could now be sworn, and proceed to view the premises. They would proceed at twelve o'clock.

Mr. Heron—Thank your lordship. We will be getting up steam in the meantime (laughter).

The following were then sworn on this special jury:—

These gentlemen were conveyed in a special train, accompanied by two engineers, to take "a view" of the cause of action.

SENTENCE.

Michael Dwyer was placed at the bar to receive sentence, and was thus addressed by the learned Judge—Michael Dwyer, you were indicted yesterday, and very properly, for murder, by taking the life of Robert Bradshaw, but, on the evidence for the Crown not sustaining that indictment, the counsel for the Crown consented to take a verdict against you for the lesser crime of manslaughter. The unfortunate man who lost his life was a bailiff in the decree which he went to enforce, as he was in duty bound to do, and taking into account the high character—the very high character—which you received from the Rev. Mr. Apjohn, I cannot shut my eyes to this fact, that you brought yourself into the melancholy and pitiable position in which you now stand. You had been guilty of a rescue in the morning, which is an offence which would subject you to severe punishment, for you must all know and understand that our courts of law would be useless if the lives of those entrusted with the execution of their civil process were not held sacred. I do not think that you wished to injure any one, but your act was a reckless one, and I cannot, therefore, much as I could wish to deal mercifully with you, pass a light sentence on you. I cannot deal with you as I could wish to do in consequence of your previous good

He will also long be remembered with affection by his companions and associates of the Clare Militia, in which he served.
