

At the last Listowel petty sessions, a lad was convicted on a charge of stealing apples, and sent to gaol a week.

The *Trillick Chronicle* contains the following:—A straisland correspondent states that several pigs and three cows have recently died from disease in that district, and that he has every reason to believe that they have been sold for human food. The annual show of the South Wexford Farming Society was held on Thursday, in a field adjacent to the town of Wexford. Owing, however, to the lateness of the hour at which the judges proceeded to make their adjudications, they were unable, in consequence of the arrangements for the trains leaving for Dublin, to give more than a portion of the prizes awarded. A gentleman who has lately travelled through Iowa says that there are at least 20,000 returned soldiers at work in that state, helping to save the harvest. He hardly saw an idle soldier in the state.

The North German Lloyd's steamship *New York*, sailed from Southampton yesterday, for New York direct with the German, French, and English mails. She took 150 cabin passengers, together with a large cargo, including French jewellery to the value of 12,000 francs.

The *New York Times* asserts that General Butler, in conjunction with the Attorney-General, will take a prominent part in the prosecution of Mr. Davis.

A meeting has been held in New York, of the directors of Ketchum, and it was voted to accept a dividend of 60 per cent., 50 per cent. to be paid by the end of November, and the remainder in three months. The liabilities are said to be 4,000,000 dollars, and the assets 3,000,000 dollars. The firm of Thomas Ketchum will resume business, but no provision will be made out of the assets for the payment of E. R. Ketchum's forged cheques.
