works which now and and again crop up in the social atmosphere—an elopement—was brought to an unseemly end at Queenstewn, on yesterday. A working jeweller named Samuel Doran, aged about forty years, and a young woman of decidedly handsome countenance, were amongst the passengers awaiting the arrival of the Glasgow, the ontward bound American steamer for last Thursday, which did not, however, arrive from Liverpool until yesterday. They were both natives of Dublin, from which place they arrived in Queenstown on Thursday. Owing to the non arrival of the steamer, they were obliged to engage lodgings in the the town, choosing for that purpose Robinson's Hotel, where they proceeded to pass the night. But at an advanced hour two persons called at the hotel and proceeded to make very solicitous inquiries after the truent pair, and one of them as much as intimated that e gay Lothario was "wanted." Those is turned out to be Detective Johnstone two individ of the Metropolitan Police, and Detective Mahony, of the local constabulary—the former of whom had been entrusted with the execution of a warrant for the apprehension of Doran for the robbery of a large quantity of valuable jewellery from his employer, the proprietor of an extensive jewellery concern in Sackville-street, Dublin. He was immediately arrested and conveyed to the local bridewell, from which he was removed to Cork on yesterday, en route to Dublin there to answer the charge. On the detective opening the prisoner's box, it was found to contain a passage ticket by the Glasgow, in the name of O'Connor-which name he had evidently assumed - a large number of gold and silver watches, amounting in all to over twenty, and some dozen pairs of boots, believed to be the property of the fair inamorata's father, a boot and shoemaker. Doran, previous to his removal from Queenstown, was visited by his companion in flight, who wept bitterly at the prospect of their designs of future happiness being thus ultimately blasted. She also proceeded to Dublin immediately, it is to be hoped, a wiser woman.—Cork Herald.

ANTICIPATED JUDICIAL CHANGES IN ENGLAND.—It is rumoured that Chief Justice Erle, of the Court of Common Pleas, is to be raised to the peerage. Sir Vaughan Williams, of the same court, is not expected to resume his judicial duties on the bench, which, if it be the case, will be much regretted both by the bench and the bar. It is thought that Mr. Mellish, Q.C., will be offered a judgeship, the Attorney General, being an equity lawyer, not claiming a judgeship at common law.
