

in civil rights on account of colour, was called up and discussed. Oregon adopted constitutional amendment. Johnson informed the Provisional Governor at Georgia; that whilst sanctioning the inauguration of the Governor Elect, this inauguration will terminate the duties of Provisional Governor, who will be informed of the time when he will be relieved. A communication was received from the New York Chamber of Commerce, and referred to the Executive Committee, recommending the holding of a National Cotton Growing Convention, to take measures to raise a cotton crop next year equal to that of the year preceding the war, viz., 500,000 bales. The Fenian President (Roberts) has issued his inaugural address calling on the Fenians to act promptly. England must meet privateers on every ocean, be struck wherever vulnerable, and where the Irish at home can be best assisted. The Fenians are said to have 2,000,000 dollars in voluntary cash subscriptions on hand. Logan dined with Romero at Washington on Wednesday. Romero received advices that Esobedo, after raising the siege of Matamoras, had left for Monterey to raise resources. Juarez has written a letter to the Mexican Consul at San Francisco, stating that family and personal interests incline him to retire into private life, and will joyfully resign the Presidency, as soon as the election can be held.

LONDON CATTLE MARKET.

The total imports of foreign stock into London, last week, amounted to 41,703 head. In the corresponding period in 1864 we received 5,406; in 1863, 3,251; in 1862, 2,440; in 1861 2,332; in 1860 2,031; in 1859-60, 1,163; in 1859, 2,554; and in 1858, 8,550 head.

LONDON PROVISION MARKETS.

In the Irish butter market there is no alteration to notice, the demand very limited, and prices nominally without change. Foreign early in the week advanced 2s to 4s per cwt, but has since receded to the same extent. The bacon market declined about 1s per cwt, which caused rather more business to be transacted, and sales of the best Waterford make 62s on board, shipped, and for early shipment.
