His Excellency the Lord Lieutenant has accepted the invitation of the Benchers of King's Inns to dine with that body, in the Hall of the Inns, on Monday, the 15th of June, that being the last day of term.

A magisterial investigation took place yesterday in the Court-house of Ballinasloe, before the Hon. Robt. Trench and several of the local justices, into charges preferred against Mr. David Breen, master, and Miss Mary Anne Duane, schoolmistress of the Ballinasloe workhouse, of having concealed the birth of a female child, and made away with the body by throwing it into one of the cesspools of the establishment. The male prisoner, who has a wife and eight children, confessed to having carried on an improper intimacy with Miss Duane, but up to the present there is no evidence to show that he participated in the crime of having destroyed the life of the infant. The inquiry has not yet concluded.

A melancholy accident occurred at Mallow railway station on Tuesday afternoon, resulting in the death of an industrious man named Patt Healy, formerly of that town, but lately resident in Cork. Healy was a pig-dealer, and attended the monthly fair held in Mallow, where he and some others jointly invested three or four hundred pounds. They were engaged in forwarding the pigs to Cork on some trucks. The deceased was on some of these, when, by some mischance, he fell off, and the truck passed over him, severing his head from his body.

On the night of the 3rd, some evil-disposed persons maliciously broke and otherwise destroyed a number of young trees, and injured two pillars of a gate on the farm of Mr. Patrick Clarke, at Kilkerry, near Louth. Mr. Clarke is much respected, and it is a matter of surprise that such an outrage should have been committed.

General Grant has been presented by his fellow-citizens of Philadelphia with a new house, fully furnished. It cost, with the furniture, about fifty-thousand dollars—£10,000.

A detachment of 90 non-commissioned officers and privates belonging to the 46th Foot, invalided from the service companies of the regiment in India, arrived in Dublin on Sunday last, under the command of an officer from the 26th Cameronians, at Portsmouth, and left by train *en route* to Templemore, to join the depot battalion.

Edward Hood, a brakesman on the London and North Eastern railway was killed on Tuesday. The buffer of the engine struck him and knocked his head to pieces, and, falling on the line, the wheels passed over the bruised man, cutting off one of his feet, and so completely decapitating him that the only part of his head remaining attached to the trunk was a small shred of one of the ears.
