To Architects.

MASONIC HALL, DAME-STREET.

THE Committee appointed by the Grand Lodge of Freemasons in Ireland will receive Designs from Architects, members of the Masonic Order, for the Erection of a New Masonic Hall, Lodge Rooms, Offices, &c., on the site of their premises, Nos. 17 and 18, Moleworth-street, in the City of Dublin, the total cost, including the removal of the buildings on the site, architect's commission, &c., not to exceed £8,000.

The Committee are willing to employ the architect whose plans may be considered the most eligible to superintend the execution of the works, in which case no premium will be given, but a per centage on the gross amount of the building will be allowed.

Should the architect not be so employed, a premium of £60 will be given instead. The architects producing the second and third best designs will be paid the sums of £50 and £30 respectively, the several plans to become the property of the Committee.

The above premiums will not be awarded, nor any plan adopted, until it shall have been clearly ascertained that the buildings can be erected for the sum mentioned. The designs to be sent in (free of expense) in a sealed envelope, with a motto or distinguishing mark attached, but without the name of the architect, which is to be sent in another sealed envelope, bearing a similar motto or mark, and those not approved will be returned in such way as their respective owners may suggest. A plan of the site, with instructions, and all other particulars, may be had on application at the Grand Secretary's Office, Dame-street on payment of the fee of five shillings. The designs to be sent in to the above office on or before the 22nd day of July, 1865.
