

Washington telegraphed that McKenna should not be regarded as belonging to the Cuban Legation. The late Department telegraphed that McKenna was entitled to diplomatic privileges.

BROWNSVILLE, Feb. 2.—Colonel Brown has succeeded Weitzel in the command of the Rio Grande district. The United States marshal is arresting and warning all parties in Brownsville and the neighbourhood. Colonel Reid Crawford's adjutant, was arrested for complicity in the Bagdad affair. Captain Inclair of the Liberal army was arrested and charged with violating the neutrality laws. A United States collector at Sharkeyville has also been arrested. A French man-of-war has arrived at the mouth of the Rio Grande. 2,000 French troops are expected. An aide-de-camp to Maximilian arrived at Matamoros on the 1st. Cortinas and his forces have left for parts unknown. The police arrested a man in New York, late at night, with a waggon full of arms and ammunition. O'Mahony claimed it as his property. The man and property were discharged. The Canadian Commissioners failed to agree with the Committee of Ways and Means on the terms of the new reciprocity treaty. It is supposed that the treaty expiring next month will not be prolonged. Pacific advices state that Peru has formed an offensive and defensive alliance with Chili, and declared war against Spain. It was hoped at Lima that the other South American republics would join the alliance: three Peruvian frigates and two corvettes had left to join the Chilean fleet. The Spaniards in Lima are ordered not to leave the country, but to have their names registered under surveillance. The Peruvian Government have taken other precautions to have the power of making reprisals in case the Spaniards take possession of any part of the coast or inflict other damage. The Spanish fleet had thoroughly blockaded Valparaiso and attacked the city. The City of Washington, City of Cork, Antwerp, and Bolivian have arrived out.
