Five hundred bank clerks have been thrown out of employment by the recent bank stoppages.

Colonel Dawkins is making extensive preparations for an active campaign against the military authorities. Besides a petition to Parliament which appeared in *extenso* in a daily contemporary a few days since, he is taking legal proceedings against Lord Rokeby, and the case is likely to come on for trial during the present term.

The *Army and Navy Gazette* says—"The Fenians have no base of operations at all. In their rear is a hostile fleet, an outraged Government, a vast army, headed by one of the greatest captains of modern times. Arrayed against them in front is all that is powerful and energetic. Canada rests on all the appliances and force, naval and military, which Great Britain can bring to her aid. The river they have crossed is guarded by Federal gunboats, the great lakes are patrolled by Federal men-of-war, and, unless there be something in it that we cannot see, a more singularly, wicked, and contemptible enterprise has never been described or imagined."

The new English Divorce Act, passed on Monday, has been printed. It contains several important provisions. Hitherto the court, on a dissolution of marriage has been in the practice of ordering a gross or annual payment to be made to a wife; but it has happened frequently that a husband has had no property on which such an order could be made. The court is now empowered to make an order for monthly or weekly payment, and if the husband is unable to continue such payment, to discharge or modify the order, or to suspend the same wholly or in part. In certain cases relief may be granted to a respondent as if a petition had been filed seeking such relief. A decree nisi for a dissolution of marriage is not to be absolute for six months, unless a shorter time is specially fixed. The Act has immediate operation, and is now in force.

Captain William C. Chamberlain, recently appointed to the command of the Asia and steam reserve at Portsmouth, joined the Asia and entered upon the duties of his office on Saturday last.

Hostilities have commenced between the Prussians and the Federal army. The 4th Darmstadt infantry has been almost annihilated by the Prussians at Friedberg, between Frankfort and Gleissen. Large bodies of Federal troops are massed at Mayence and Frankfort, where the Wurtemberg contingent arrived last night.

The Austrian Consul General Herr Von Gunner, has left Leipzig in Saxony, and the British Consul (Mr. Aprowe) has undertaken to represent the commercial interests of Austria.

The Croatian deputation returned from Pesth to Agram. Negotiations for union with Hungary are not yet brought to a successful conclusion. The fraction of the Opposition under the leadership of M. Ghysezy has separated itself from the fraction which, under the leadership of M. Deak, is now pursuing a policy favourable to the Government.

The Prussian President of the Holstein Government has addressed a circular to the authorities, ordering them to discontinue the use of the word "ducal" in public documents issued from their offices.

The accounts from Canada are of a most conflicting nature, for while the Fenians are reported as completely defeated; yet large bands of them have been stated to be at different places threatening Montreal and Toronto. The reported arrest of Sweeney and Roberts have not been confirmed; and while there can be no doubt as to the ultimate annihilation of the Fenian expedition in Canada, yet these desperadoes are likely to require larger forces for their overthrow than those set against them.

A Venice telegram states that fresh arrests had taken place there, and several more persons had been expelled the city.

A Berlin telegram states that a Royal proclamation has been prepared for distribution by the Prussians among the inhabitants of the German States through which they may pass.
