sheep; 50 veal calves.

Good Beef very scarce, and easily sold at 65s; a
house fed animals made 70s per cwt. The various
prices below these prices varied with quality, age,
&c. Finished grass beef was unusually deficient;
and those adopting early house feeding are reaping
the benefit of that step in the march of intellect in
the agricultural world. Sheep were in large supply
and less demand; best aged Mutton scarcely a shade
over 7d per lb. Veal 7d to 9d, Store Sheep much
neglected, and some, a second time, turned out
for sale. Beef and Mutton approach the level of
reason in similarity of price—the former likely to be
scarce, the latter in better supply. In Wool we had
a week's life only, and that mercurial article has
again become easier to purchase. Corn, as we
anticipated, receded from the high ebb of its tidal
movement, and finds its level in the ocean of supply
and demand, receding gently from the highest point,
with no spring tides expected. Money abundant;
making investment at ordinary rates of interest;
with prudence marking the movements of lenders.
Nothing political to disturb the confidence of any,
not the fearful and unbelieving in the stability of
constitutional and tolerant governments.
