

CORK BUTTER MARKET.

At the Manchester petty sessions on Wednesday, Patrick Gohan and Michael O'Rourke, who have been in custody for the past fortnight, were brought before Lewis Algeo, Esq., and the Hon. Lieutenant Colonel Carew, R.M., charged with writing and sending a threatening letter to Mr. H. Lyons Montgomery, J.P., and a member of the grand jury. Mr. Montgomery proved the receipt of the letter, and Mr. Nixon proved the passing of the letter, which was posted in Dower, through Drumkerran Post-office. A man named Sweeney stated that Gohan, who is a tailor, used to make clothes for him, and from the opportunistic witness of seeing Gohan's handwriting, he believed that the threatening letter was written by Gohan. He further mentioned that he, with a man named Evans, was passing into M'Morrow's public-house in Drumkerran on the 20th of December last, when the prisoner Gohan called him aside, and asked him to post a letter. Witness asked him what the letter was about, when Gohan said, "It's a letter to Montgomery, and a good one, and will give him a touch for his tyranny." The prisoner was committed for trial.

Mr. Herford, coroner for Manchester, held an inquest on Tuesday on the body of John Brown, placid Walker-street, Hardman-street, Manchester, aged 18 years. The deceased's father said that so long as 7 months ago the deceased was tying a dog's feet preparatory to drowning it. The dog bit his right hand, and the wound was afterwards cauterised. The deceased suffered no pain till Thursday last, when he complained that his arm felt "dead." On Saturday he refused to take milk, but did not seem to fear it. He subsequently refused both meat and drink, and then became wildly delirious, and foamed at the mouth. On Sunday morning he died. Mr. J. Stephens, surgeon, said that from what he witnessed he was satisfied the present case was one of hydrophobia. A verdict of "Death from hydrophobia, caused by the bite of a dog," was returned.

A Paris correspondent says:—A new engine has been discovered for the destruction of human life. Some ingenious person, who withholds his name, has invented a 50-pound breech-loader, and a gun-carriage to match, which beat all previous inventions. The new gun is about to be experimented on at Toulon. I have before me authentic evidence to the effect that the French Ordnance Committee have come to the conclusion first, that the breech-loader is a mistake for large calibre; and that for rifled guns, throwing heavy shot, the Whitworth gun is the best. The only thing against it is cost.
