Ministerial, in no sense committing the Executive to
an approval of the amendment. On the contrary
a proper appreciation of Constitutional interests, national
harmony, and union, and a deference for enlight-
ened public judgment, suggest doubts whether the
Constitutional amendment ought to be proposed
by Congress, and pressed upon the Legislature for
final decision, until the admission of loyal members
from the now unrepresented States.

Mr. Bigelow, of Paris, on June 4th, wrote to Mr.
Seward that M. Drouyn de Lhuys stated that the re-
cent declaration that the French troops would be
withdrawn from Mexico was made in good faith, and
that the troops would be withdrawn within the time
specified.

The Imperialists are reported to be abandoning im-
portant points in the interior of Mexico. Maximilian
was in great financial distress. The Liberals were
closely investing Tampico.

The trial of Fenians at Montreal is progressing,
and it is believed that four of those caught firing upon
British troops will suffer death.

The Fenian President Roberts was on the floor in
the House of Representatives yesterday, in company
with General Banks.

A great Fenian mass meeting will be held in the
neighbourhood of Jones' Wood to-morrow, under a
call from James Stephens.

The Superintendent of Police has prohibited a
Fenian meeting taken place in Jones' Wood, on the
ground that it would interfere with the enforcement
and exercise of the law.

LONDON CATTLE MARKET.

The total imports of foreign stock into London last
week amounted to 15,608 head. In the correspond-
ing week in 1865 we received 20,395; in 1864,
12,154; in 1863, 7,323; in 1862, 9,340; in 1861,
9,592, and in 1860, 11,806 head.

There was a fair show of stock from Holland, under
the new Order in Council. The total supply was
rather extensive, and in fair average condition. Sales
progressed slowly, at late rates.

We were very moderately supplied with home-fed
beasts. Their quality, however, was by no means
first-rate. The receipts from Ireland and Scotland
were limited. Although the demand for all breeds of
beasts was very inactive, last week's quotations were
well supported. The general top figure was 5s 8d;
but a few very inferior Scots and crosses realised 5s
10d per 8lbs.

From Norfolk, Suffolk, Essex, and Cambridgeshire
we received 1,200 Scots and crosses; from other parts
of England, including Lincolnshire, 800 various
breeds; from Scotland, 32 Scots and crosses; and
from Ireland 53 oxen, &c.

The show of sheep was seasonably extensive, and
in good condition. Sales progressed slowly; never-
theless, the prices current on this day were not
maintained. The best Downs and half breeds sold at
5s 10d to 6s per 8lbs.

Lombs—the supply of which was moderate—
were inactive, at late rates, viz, from 6s 8d to 8s per
8lbs.

The supply of calves was extensive, and the veal
trade was heavy, at depressed currencies. The top
figure was 5s 6d per 8lbs.

The demand for pigs was heavy, at last week's
prices, viz., from 4s to 5s per 8lbs.
