The screw iron troopship Tamar embarked on Thurs-
 day at Portsmouth the 1st battalion of the 17th

 and the 13th Regiment will afterwards embark and
 proceed in the ship to Queenstown, where they will

 there the 61st Regiment for conveyance to Quebec.

The Post says that yesterday a squadron of the 13th

 embarking at Liverpool.

THE CURATES' QUESTION.—We extract, from a
 recent address of the National Association for Freedom
 of Worship, the following remarks in favour of self-
 supporting *versus* eleemosynary plans of Church ex-
 tension:—"Every mission or school church may,
 upon the Scriptural system, be worked so as to
 yield a minimum stipend of £160 a year to the officiating
 priest, instead of being, as upon the London,
 Manchester, and other diocesan societies' plan, unpro-
 ductive. Four millions sterling, annually, is thus lost
 to the Church. Large masses of people now give
 nothing to support religious ministrations, whom the
 National Society for Freedom of Worship would
 render 'cheerful givers' for their support 'every
 Lord's Day.' The society's work tends, therefore, to
 increase the demand for, and consequent remunera-
 tion of curates. To the laborious, ill-paid, and un-
 represented curates of the Church of England, the
 society appeals to support the great Scriptural prin-
 ciples of "free worship and free offering."
