LONDON CATTLE MARKET

A very small supply of beasts was on sale in our market to day. Amongst it were 61 Scots and crosses from Scotland, in prime condition. The trade was very firm, and the quotations had an upward tendency. The general top figure was 5s 4d per 8lbs. The show of sheep was moderate; but the quality of best breeds was good. Woolled sheep in request for Birmingham, &c., and the mutton trade was rather active, at very full prices. Prime Downs and half-breds in the wool, sold at 6s 8d to 7s; out of the wool 4d per 8lbs. There were no calves on offer. Pigs moved off slowly on former terms.

1,535 beasts, 1,944 sheep, and 32 calves. With a risk demand, and absolute scarcity of beef and mutton, sales were freely made at 65s to 70s, and in some superior lots 72s 6d per cwt for prime beef. Top wether mutton, 11d; fancy lots 11½d per lb. Stores begin to appear in the market, and are bought up with much confidence by graziers. Holders of store stock are likely to be well paid for holding over, as confidence seems restored, and the grass lands must be covered with their usual stock. Lambs are not coming in plentifully, and the few that appear of full age and size for market meet easy sales at 25s to 35s each. Wool holds its own under the discouragement of a German quarrel, and is likely to open at new clip with full prices. Long coming wether, 2s; hogget, 2s 1d; mixed in proportion; skin, 1s 9d to 1s 10d.
