LIVERPOOL COTTON MARKET.

First Report—Market opens with moderate
 demand, and, pending the action of the Bank, the
 prices at present look as if they would foot up 8,000 or
 9,000 bales.

Second Report—Market steady. Sales, 12,000
 bales; 5,000 on speculation and for export.

MANCHESTER CORN MARKET.

Market more numerously attended, and the weather
 being dry and frosty, trade firmer in tone. Transac-
 tions were, however, only limited, and we reduce quo-
 tations 6d to 1s per quarter on all but best sorts of
 English and foreign wheats, and 6d per sack on Eng-
 lish and French flour. Other articles unchanged.

GLASGOW CATTLE MARKET.

The supply of cattle was larger than last week;
 demand fair, and prices unchanged. The number of
 sheep was also larger, and, to effect sales, a reduction
 of 1s to 2s per head had to be submitted to. Top
 quality, 65s to 66s per cwt., secondary, 58s to 63s;
 falling and inferior, 50s to 53s. Mutton, 7½d to
 8d per lb.

DUBLIN CATTLE MARKET.

The market to-day was not so largely attended as
 expected, but there was a considerable show of
 sheep. Prices ruled much like last, but sheep
 were slower. Comparatively few finished cattle as
 for sale; veal dear, at 9d to 11d per lb. Butchers
 ready asking ½d per lb. for prime joints more than
 Christmas.
