Montreal, Friday, June 1st—Reports have just reached us that a large body of Fenians have seized the arms at Rouse's Point, and are now marching on the British fort at Isle aux Nois. About 300 men reached St. Albans this morning. Two large bodies of troops are now leaving, one to reinforce the garrison at Isle aux Nois, and the other that of St. John's. The Fenians have burnt a bridge at Fort Eric and cut four of the telegraph wires there.

The Government have just received information that the United States gunboat Michigan, has intercepted reinforcements to the Fenians, and landed at Fort Erie this morning- Those who have landed are marching pellinell towards Chippewa, about four niles from Niagara. Troops from Hamilton are marching to capture them. 400 more Fenians arrived at St. Alban's this morning. A battery of Armstrong guns and two wings of the of the 25th and 30th Regiments, in addition to those mentioned in my telegram of I p.m, will leave in an hour to meet

Montreal, Friday June 1st, 8.80 p.m.—I have received a telegram from Ottawa, stating that Government has been informed that 6,000 Fenians are marching from Fort Erie to Fort Colborne, for the purpose of destroying the locks of Welland Canal. They will be encountered to morrow by troops and a battery of Armstrong guns under Colonel Peacocke.

Buffalo, Friday, June 1.—Colonel O'Neill commands the troops that made the lauding from here. He is styled "Commander of the Army of the Irish Republic in Canada." It is reported that General Sweenv crossed over into Canada with the main body of the Fenian force, but this is denied by those who of the Fenian force, but this is denied by those who should know. It is said that men are constantly crossing from this side, and without difficulty. There is no United States force here to prevent them doing so, and the United States steamer Michigan has had no orders or authority to stop parties from crossing. It now appears that a concentration is to be made not far from here in Canada, and after receiving expected reinforcements, the Fenians will move on some im-portant city. This, however, may not take place for portant city. two or three days.

Cincinnati, Friday, June 1.—The Commercial's Cobumbus, Ohio, despatch says that 450,000 rounds of ammunition were shipped from that place to New York, and 150,000 to Chicago, and 30,000 muskets to Buffalo, within a few days, which it is reported were

St. Albans, Vt., Friday, June 1.—About 200 Fenians arrived this morning by the night trains from Boston. They are in citizens' dress, without arms or equipments to indicate hostile intentions. Their conduct so far has been most peaceable and orderly. There are rumours that several hundred more Fenians are to arrive here in the next 24 hours.

Boston, Friday, June I.—In addition to the Fenian cavalry regiment, the Third Fenian Infantry, Colonel Connor, 1,200 strong, have left this city for the Canana border. Transportation for the cavalry regiment was paid through to St Albans by a citizen of Bos-ton. Detachments of United States troops from Fort Warren and Independence, also from Preble, are under orders for the Northern frontier.

Elmira, N.Y., Friday, June 1.—The Fifth Maryland Cavalry Regiment and part of the Fenian army of invasion, under the command of Colonel Denis Donahue, passed through the city to-day, en route to Ogdensburg. They number sixty men. While wait-Ogdensburg. They number sixty men. While waiting for the Eastern train they fell to fighting among themselves at the depot. They had with them six cases of muskets and eight box of rations and ammunition. A report from Corning says 600 Fenians
